Cover Page Proposed Changes to Senate Rules on Senate Committees

1. Purpose for submitting: Submitting for approval

2. Type of proposal: Campuswide policies (including Senate Rules)

3. Specific action being requested: Approve

4. Proposer: *Senate Council*

5. Effective date: Immediate

Explain the proposal:

At its retreat on May 15, 2023, SC discussed a number of topics related to Senate committees. Below are the Senate Rules references being changed, each with a brief description of the issue being addressed by the revision. All changes are effective immediately. The file with specific SR changes deliberately omitted SR text that was not relevant to these changes, in order to shorten the file.

- Changes related to ex officio members for specific committees: The Senate Council recommends specifying that ex officio members are nonvoting. The Senate Council also recommends deleting references to specific titles of administrators and instead asking for nominations from the President for individuals with expertise in specific areas, which will ensure administrative representation on Senate committees is not affected by organizational restructurings. There is existing language specifying certain individuals be nominated by the Provost and that language is unchanged; the intent is to only remove administrative titles.
- Senate Rules 1.4.1.1 ("Types of Senate Committees"): The Senate Council recommends adding language expressly charging the Senate Council with, if needed, addressing conflicts of interest or power differentials in Senate committees.
- <u>Senate Rules 1.4.1.3.1 ("Subcommittees"):</u> The Senate Council would like for subcommittee
 memberships to be overseen by the Senate Council Chair. However, the Senate Council already
 has the authority to appoint committee chairs and that authority should be extended to
 subcommittees.
- Senate Rules 1.4.2.3 ("Senate Admissions and Academic Standards Committee"): The Senate
 Council recommends combining the Senate Admissions and Academic Standards Committee
 (SAASC) with the Senate Admissions Advisory Committee, to be a single committee with two
 standing subcommittees. Currently, one committee meets regularly and the other does not due

to limited opportunities to be involved with current practices. Combining them will help ensure broad oversight and sufficient members to review overall University admissions, progression, and graduation policies, as well as college- and program-specific policies.

There are still various passages in the Senate Rules that refer to the SAASC and SAAC, which need to be updated to reflect the new composition and charge. The Senate Council recommends asking the newly combined committee to deliberate on those sections and suggest modifications.

1.4.1 STRUCTURE OF UNIVERSITY SENATE COMMITTEES

[US: 2/13/89, US: 2/3/2003; 5/2/2022]

1.4.1.1 Types of Senate Committees

The University Senate may perform its functions directly, through the Senate Council, through the standing committees, or special committees of the Senate. The Senate may also establish advisory committees and may delegate any of its authority or responsibility to the <u>Graduate School</u> or the faculties of Colleges, Schools, Departments, Centers and Institutes. (<u>GR IV.B</u>).

For <u>courses</u> homed outside of a college, the Senate designates the different faculty committees that are responsible for each of those <u>courses</u> in a relationship similar to the responsibility of an educational unit faculty for a course. Those committees shall annually report to the Senate Council on the academic status and operation of their courses.

The University Senate shall have three types of committees.

- 1. Standing committees of the Senate responsible only to that body;
- 2. Special committees (hereafter referred to as ad hoc committees); and
- 3. Advisory committees responsible in an advisory capacity to the President and/or other administrative officers and to the Senate.

Committees are composed of elected faculty senators and other members of the University Senate, as well as students, faculty who are not senators, and administrative staff. All student members of Senate committees are assumed to be recommended by the Student Government Association unless indicated otherwise.

The Senate Council has the responsibility to identify and, as appropriate, mitigate potentially problematic power dynamics and conflicts of interest in committees (e.g., a committee member who has an official reporting relationship to another committee member, or committee members in close family relationships). The chairs of Senate standing committees may appoint <u>ad hoc sub</u>committees <u>and but mustmay</u> select their members in consultation with the Chair of the Senate Council. Such a subcommittee must be chaired by a member of the parent committee <u>and the Senate Council shall determine the chair.</u>

There shall be two nonvoting ex officio nonvoting members.

Soliciting a report annually from the University's office responsible for undergraduate admissions, which shall contain enrollment goals for first-time freshmen and transfer cohorts established in consultation with the colleges, and using that to recommend admissions levels, considering constraints such as faculty-to-student ratio and capacity for serving students, as well as recommending circumstances under which admissions should be closed, such as when the desired class size has been reached;

4. Serving as an appeals board for applicants for admission whose applications were rejected (SR 4.2.1.1.1.2.2). (The SAASC's decision under this appeal stage constitutes the final University decision on the application.):

5. Recommending appropriate cut-off scores for the CLEP, AP, PEP and IB examinations (SR 5.2.1.1); and

6. Reviewing proposals and making recommendations related to program-related admissions and University-level admissions policies.

1.4.2.3.1.2 Academic Standards Subcommittee Charge

The Academic Standards Subcommittee shall be charged with making recommendations related to academic standards, progression requirements, and graduation requirements. The Academic Standards Subcommittee is specifically charged with the following:

1. Making recommendations regarding grading rules.

2. Reviewing and recommending policies related to college-level requirements.

3. Reviewing and recommending policies related to granting academic credit, graduation requirements, and probation and suspension.

4. Reviewing and recommending conditions of merit and circumstance for graduation requirements, degree honors conferred upon graduating students, and honorary degrees.

The SCDLeL shall be composed of a sufficient number of elected faculty senators to conduct business. (see SR 1.4.1.1.2) The voting faculty membership of the committee shall be generally representative of the colleges with active distance learning or eLearning programs.

1.4.2.13.3.3 Student Members

There shall be two voting student members who must be enrolled in online <u>courses</u> or have experience with online <u>courses</u>.

1.4.2.13.3.4 Nonvoting Ex Officio Nonvoting Members

There shall be four <u>nonvoting</u> ex officio <u>nonvoting</u> members:

• One member nominated by the University department or office responsible for enhancing learning and teaching (if applicable):

 One member nominated by the University department or office responsible for distance learning <u>programs</u>;

 One member nominated by the University department or office responsible for information technology; and

• One member nominated by the University department or office responsible for addressing accessibility issues.

NOTE: For the purposes of this rule, the following two definitions shall apply:

Distance Learning – A formal educational process in which the majority of the instruction (interaction between students and instructors and among students) in a <u>course</u> occurs when students and instructors are not in the same physical location. Instruction may be synchronous or asynchronous.

eLearning – A broad combination of processes, content, and infrastructure to use computers and networks to scale or improve one or more significant parts of a learning value chain, including management and delivery.

- 3. If called upon by Senate to do, it shall also broadly communicate these policies to all <u>undergraduate colleges</u>. (see SR 9.19<insert link>)
- 4. It shall recommend to the Senate Council all <u>courses</u> which are proposed to the University Senate to fulfill the <u>program</u> requirements.
- 5. It shall maintain long-term oversight of the <u>program</u>, including periodic <u>course</u> review and <u>program</u> assessment to ensure that the <u>program</u> fulfills the learning outcomes.
- 6. It shall recommend to the Senate Council the deletion of <u>courses</u> (or pairs of <u>courses</u>) from the <u>program</u> that no longer seem appropriate to the <u>program</u>, and recommend to colleges or departments, through the Chair, such changes concerning teaching and content as it deems necessary or appropriate.
- 7. It shall continue to work to enhance the <u>program</u> and assert the <u>program</u>'s centrality to the undergraduate curriculum through involvement in university-wide planning and policy discussions related to the <u>program</u>.
- 8. Upon the recommendation of the Undergraduate Council or upon its own initiative, it shall develop and propose to the Undergraduate Council changes in the structure of the <u>program</u> or in the requirements necessary to complete the <u>program</u>
- 9. It shall report individual cases of temporary waivers of or temporary substitutions for <u>program</u> requirements to the Undergraduate Council.
- 10. It shall set policies for the granting of credit to transfer students for <u>courses</u> taken which are equivalent to those in the <u>program</u> and it shall communicate these policies to all <u>undergraduate colleges</u> (SR 9.19) on campus.

SUKCEC shall make recommendations to the Senate Council (SC) concerning all waivers of or substitutions for <u>program</u> requirements for particular categories of students. The SC's approval of temporary waivers of, or substitutions for, <u>program</u> requirements for particular categories of students shall be final.

 5. After consultation with the Assistant Provost for Enrollment Management, the SAAC may recommend to the Provost closing admissions on any of the following bases: 1) the desired class size has been reached; 2) the class is large enough given existing constraints; and 3) admissions objectives other than class size have been achieved.

6. Establish parameters for the decisions on exceptions, under which applicants may be admitted who have not met the automatic admissions criteria.

7. Request that the Provost provide specific data on admissions, enrollment, and student performance.
