# Draft Charge for Ad Hoc Committee on Absence Policies University Senate November 13, 2023

1 The ad hoc Committee on Attendance Policies is charged with clarifying and harmonizing the Senate

2 Rules regarding required attendance, by evaluating existing attendance policies and recommending new

Senate Rules or changes to the Senate Rules. The Committee shall conduct benchmarking, literature

4 reviews, and evaluate best practices.

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6 The Committee will present an interim report for Senate Council and Senate in Spring 2024 and the

report must include the following: 1) synopsis or timeline of the history of the current Senate Rules on

attendance, 2) mechanics of attendance policies, such as excused and unexcused absences, reasonable

accommodations, and the current 20% threshold on absences, and 3) a discussion on why attendance

matters in a 21<sup>st</sup> century university as it relates to student mastery of course learning outcomes. In its

deliberations, the Committee must consider matters such as academic integrity, learning outcomes, and

Title IV and other federal regulations. The interim report must also address attendance and engagement

as it relates to student populations that differ from a traditional residential population, such as students

who are members of the uniformed services, athletic organizations, or student organizations, as well as

15 changes brought about synchronous and asynchronous distance learning.
