COURSE DESCRIPTION: A-H 334 Studies in Renaissance Art

According to the subtitle, a study of specific developments, problems, and issues pertaining to art production between 1300-1550. May be repeated under a different subtitle to a maximum of six credits. Prereq: A-H 106 recommended.

Subtitle. Identity in the Renaissance

The course explores the development between 1390 and 1520 of the idea of the European artist as a creative genius with a distinct identity and individuality. It traces the ways in which the social and intellectual concerns of artists brought about acceptance of their work as a "liberal art," and how, through the recognition they gained for the intellectual foundations of their activities, they achieved artistic autonomy from enlightened patrons. Individual and collaborative research will explore a different concept of identity in the Renaissance, that of women. Both individually and as a class, students will attempt through the evidence of art to address the question, "Did women have a Renaissance?"

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

By the semester's end, you should be better able to:

• identify major art works, trends, and issues in the visual arts of the Renaissance

analyze and interpret images

read art historical literature effectively and critically

demonstrate basic research skills in art history

- write clearly and cogently about art historical problems for the intelligent reader and give effective class presentations
- work collaboratively with fellow students
