Course Description:

Study of artistic and other visual production of a period, geographical location, theme, or medium, with emphasis on its interdisciplinary connections. Depending on the topic, readings and research may engage with a wide variety of disciplines, for example, literature, music, theater, history, political science, philosophy, classics, anthropology, etc. *May be repeated under a different subtitle to a maximum of six credits*. Prereq: Junior standing or permission of instructor.

Subtitle: Arts of Roman Religions

The seminar will study religious art in the Roman Empire from about 100 CE to the time of Constantine, including monuments of the state religion and relationships to arts of unofficial cults and private religion. Emphasis is on the city of Rome, but case studies will include provincial evidence.

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. You will learn to understand selected works of roman religious art and architecture, in the context of their making and use, in a period of social, political and religious change;
- 2. You will be able to find, understand and criticize modern scholarship in multiple disciplines (including archaeology, epigraphy, literature, history and religious studies, as well as art and architecture history) in interpreting these objects and their context;
 - 3. You will use these skills to write a research paper for the intelligent reader that

employs the Chicago Manual of Style's humanities form of documentation as well as appropriate electronic tools for a professional presentation.

527 Requirements and Grades:

The success of a seminar requires your preparation and participation in discussion. Then, the product of your work will be application of these materials and ideas to case studies to which you contribute research and analysis of your own. Assignments and grades are designed to reward both activities:

Discussion Participation 40%, based on keeping and USING notes on the readings and on class discussions
