#### AAD 520 Proposal Change

About two years ago, a proposal to create an MA in Arts Administration to be delivered in a traditional, in-the-class room, manner was developed and was about to be reviewed by the Faculty Senate. However, before that review began, the proposal was withdrawn, and subsequently replaced by a new proposal, which called for an MA in Arts Administration delivered online, as opposed to the traditional in-the-class room manner. This second proposal was ultimately reviewed by the University Senate and approved.

When the courses for the new MA in Arts Administration appeared in the fall 2013 course registration system, the title and description for AAD 520, for some unknown reason, was wrongly described as Leadership and Planning in the Arts, which was the course's title in the original in-the-class room version that had been withdrawn from Senate consideration. This course change proposal is an attempt to change the title and description for AAD 520 to The Arts and Artists in Society, which is the correct title and description that was approved by the University Senate.

While the Arts Administration Program believes that since the confusion in the title and description for the class was merely a clerical error, the simple solution would be to just go into the system and put the right title and description in. However, we were instructed by the Senate that instead, we needed to submit a course change proposal in order for the change to be made.

<u>Introduction/Definition</u>: For the purposes of the Commission on Colleges Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accreditation review, *distance learning* is defined as a formal educational process in which the majority of the instruction (interaction between students and instructors and among students) in a course occurs when students and instructors are not in the same place. Instruction may be synchronous or asynchronous. A distance learning (DL) course may employ correspondence study, or audio, video, or computer technologies.
