A field based learning experience, under faculty supervision, in the field of Career and Technical Education.

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Identify an experiential learning opportunity related to Career and Technical Education.
- 2. Discuss how the experiential learning opportunity relates to your career in education.
- 3. Describe specific outcomes of the experiential learning opportunity related to Career and Technical Education.
- 4. Reflect on experiential learning experience related to other CTE courses.

Integration of this course with the UK Educator Preparation Unit:

This course will address the four themes of the conceptual framework for the UK professional education unit: research, reflection, learning, and leading. Students will be given the opportunity to consume research related to educational technology. By being informed consumers of this type of research, teachers can then integrate what is learned into their reflection of how they can use technology to enhance their classroom. This course emphasizes the commitment of the professional education unit to assure that its graduates move into their professional lives equipped for life-long learning as educators who will be active in leading colleagues in their schools, districts, and professional organizations. The ultimate goal in addressing these four themes is to produce teacher leaders who work together to improve student learning among diverse populations and improve education in Kentucky and beyond.

This course will provide students an opportunity to advance their knowledge and mastery of the "tools" associated with Kentucky education reform, including the Kentucky Learning Goals and Academic Expectations (LGAE), the Kentucky Program of Studies (POS), and the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System (CATS), which includes the Core Content for Assessment. As students carry out projects and complete assignments that involve instructional activities for P-12 students in Kentucky schools, they will address one or more components of the KERA initiatives. All UK professional education programs address and affirm the value of diversity in education, the use of technology to support all aspects of instructional programming, and the importance of attaining high levels of skill in assessing the outcomes of instruction. This course will provide students an opportunity to demonstrate attention to these themes and reflect on the mechanisms that this course has provided to demonstrate improved skills in these areas.

Course Expectations:

You are expected to blend learning from this experiential education component with prior academic experiences from your formal classroom. All requirements are to be turned in on or before the assigned deadline. Tardiness of assignments is not accepted. Your grade on late assignments will be reduced by 3% for each day late.

Course Guidelines/Requirements:

Identify a Faculty Mentor – This faculty mentor should be a faculty member in Agricultural Education or Family and Consumer Sciences. This faculty member will supervise you and serve as a mentor through your experiential learning experience.

Identify an Experiential Learning Mentor – This professional, employed with the company or organization in which the internship is conducted, will mentor you throughout your experiential learning component. This mentor will provide an analysis of your work through the experiential learning component.

Learning Contract – Develop a learning contract with an Agricultural Education or Family and Consumer Sciences faculty member. This contract will outline specific outcomes and responsibilities. The University of Kentucky Experiential Learning contract will be used and must be approved by the Associate Dean for Academic Programs.

Document of Hours – As outlined in the learning contract, students will need to identify the number of hours spent on through this experiential learning component. Hours should be submitted to the faculty mentor each month through a calendar or journal format.

Reflection Paper – At the conclusion of the course, students must reflect on the course through writing a 5 page reflection paper. Topics to be included in the reflection paper must include a summary of experiences, learning outcomes, analysis of industry, applications to CTE professional education courses, and thought processes of experiences.
