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SYLLABUS

Course Overview

Ceramics are among the world's most ubiquitous forms of material culture, often both useful and aesthetically pleasing. This course explores the development of ceramics in Asia through the interconnnected issues of style, technology, consumption (use), distribution, and trade. Ceramic forms made for table use, storage, architectural ornament, ritual, and display will be studied in the context of the cultures for whom they were created. The impact of Asian ceramics traditions on the growth of world "art ceramics" will also be considered.

Course Objectives

The focus of this course is on historical ceramics in East and Southeast Asia. We will learn to recognize historical ceramics from each of the areas studied, and to understand their context of use. We also will learn about the basic ceramic forming and decorating techniques native to the countries studied. We will explore not only cultural background of the areas studied, but also the ways that ceramics worked to forge cultural connections between geographic areas, including links between Asia and Western nations. Through visual images, physical works, and shards, we will attempt to gain the fullest possible understanding of the ceramic types studied. Finally, through the course paper, we will each examine one or more ceramic types in detail, examining material, technique, cultural context, and style.

Course Requirements
