## ANT 610: HISTORY OF ANTHROPOLOGICAL THEORY Sample Syllabus

Course Objectives: This course aims to give graduate students a firm grounding in the development of anthropological thought from its roots in Enlightenment social philosophy and 19<sup>th</sup> century evolutionism to the emergence of poststructuralist theory in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century. Upon completion of this course students should be thoroughly familiar with the major theoretical schools and debates in the history of anthropology and the broader social discourses that shaped them.

Course Description: In this course we will look at some fundamental anthropological theories, puzzles, and debates with an emphasis on the discipline's integrating concept, core symbol and stock-in-trade: Culture. Yet "Culture" is now part of social discourses and practices in international business, politics, medicine, and the curriculum debates in education and within academic discipline ranging from biology to anthropology and from literature to political science, scholars hotly contest and employ Culture as it is revitalized, contested, multiplied, repressed, debated, inherited, and celebrated. What, we want to know from an anthropological view, is this "Culture" in circulation? Is Culture a real object "out there" to act with and upon? Or is it a historically-situated and discursively-bound concept that is constituted in relations of power? (Or are power, history and social discourse inextricably cultural?) Is culture an explanatory or descriptive concept?

In this history of anthropological theory, some of the broader questions we will ask are: How has culture emerged as a category to talk about sameness and difference? What are the conditions of cross-cultural communication, and is anthropology a science? How have anthropologists posed the relations between culture, society, and individuals? In what ways have cultural configurations, structures, objects, texts and relations been imagined? Is culture material or ideal? How has Culture been used to distinguish "Nature" and "Human Nature," and are there rules for traffic between Culture and Nature? Does Culture (or Nature) become invisible? How have understandings of language and evolution influenced culture theory? How do cultures change? We will be concerned with the changing context of these anthropological questions and the embedded politics of their responses.

We will especially be concerned with anthropological debates in the United States and we will explore some of their European roots and counterparts, including the recent emergence of inter/anti-disciplinary Cultural Studies in the academy. We will also consider the politics and prospects of indigenous anthropologies and ask how their understandings of difference provide insight into our own cultural inquiries. As Culture is appropriated for a wide variety of social projects, does anthropology's own native concept continue to serve us, or are we "beyond" it?

Course Format & Student Responsibilities: This course is a lecture-seminar format. Our meetings will be composed of my lectures and weekly collaborative discussions lead by small students groups. Students should meet with me in advance to discuss their plans and the organization of the class. Students will be evaluated on their active participation and moreover on how well they help their colleagues think about the issues at hand. With this collaborative ethos, attendance and timeliness are essential. There are three 5-page writing assignments in which you engage concisely and substantively with the course material (see the last page of syllabus). I will also assign a final essay that will ask for an analysis that engages the readings and discussions from the entire seminar. Each of these three components – seminar participation, the 3 short essays together and the final essay – will be weighed equally to determine course grades.
