Dear Dr. Grabau,

On behalf of our faculty, I submit three major program changes for your review:

Proposed Change #1

Our program requires students to complete nine (9) credit hours of elective coursework in the major at the 300+ level. Our faculty wish to allow students to take no more than one (1) "law-type" course to satisfy this requirement. In other words, we propose that student be allowed to take only one of the following courses for the purposes of satisfying the required nine (9) credit hours of AEC 300+ level electives:

AEC 324 Agricultural Law
AEC 325 Equine Law
AEC 326 Principles of Environmental Law

To operationalize this program requirement, we propose simply to add the following statement to each course's prerequisite information (and submit these changes as a separate minor course changes):

- AEC 324 Agricultural Law
"AEC majors who have completed AEC 325 or AEC 326 are not eligible to take AEC 324 without consent of the Director of Undergraduate Studies."
- AEC 325 Equine Law
"AEC majors who have completed AEC 324 or AEC 326 are not eligible to take AEC 325 without consent of the Director of Undergraduate Studies."
- AEC 326 Principles of Environmental Law
"AEC majors who have completed AEC 324 or AEC 325 are not eligible to take AEC 326 without consent of the Director of Undergraduate Studies."

Proposed Change #2

Our program has a specialty support requirement that students must take ACC 201 and ACC 202 plus:

- Ag Econ Option
"15 additional hours of courses at the 200 level or higher to fulfill the student's area of interest and selected with advisor's approval from the following departments: ACC, AEN, AN, ASC, BAE, COM, CS, ECO, ENT, FIN, FOR, MA, MGT, MKT, PLS, PS, PSY, SOC, VS."
- Business Management Option
"completion of the requirements of the business minor, plus 3 additional hours of courses at the 200 level or higher selected with advisor's approval from the following departments: ACC, AEN, AN, ASC, BAE, COM, CS, ECO, ENT, FIN, FOR, MA, MGT, MKT, PLS, PS, PSY, SOC, VS."

We propose to change the above specialty support requirement to include ACC 201 and ACC 202 plus:

- Ag Econ Option
"15 additional hours of courses at the 200 level or higher to fulfill the student's area of interest and selected with advisor's approval from the College of Agriculture, Food, and Environment, the College of Business and Economics, or the following departments: COM, CS, GEO, MA, PS, PSY, SOC, or STA."
- Business Management Option
"completion of the requirements of the business minor, plus 3 additional hours of courses at the 200 level or higher to fulfill the student's area of interest and selected with advisor's approval from the College of Agriculture, Food, and Environment, the College of Business and Economics, or the following departments: COM, CS, GEO, MA, PS, PSY, SOC, or STA."

The following 22 programs are potentially affected by this program change:

CAFE: ABT, AED, CLD, DHN, DMT, EQM, FAM, FCS, FSC, GEN, HES, HMT, LA, MAT, NRE, PPA, RTM, SAG
 BUSINESS: B&E, and BA
 A&S: GEO and STA

Since 2010 at least, our Department has had standing approval from our Director of Undergraduate Studies to substitute courses from the above affected majors to satisfy our program's Specialty Support requirement. Thus, there is not expected to be any meaningful change in demand for courses from these programs as a result of this program change.

Dr. Amy Spriggs, Chair, Undergraduate Council, indicated via email that because we are only listing programs where students may take courses and not requiring our students to take specific courses from those programs, we do not need (her thinking) to get permission from faculty in each of these departments to list their prefixes as approved options for our program's specialty support requirement.

Proposed Change #3

Our program has a "Business Management Option" that lists CS 101 as a pre-major requirement. CS 101 has historically been a prerequisite for one or more upper-division B&E courses that comprise their Business Minor (e.g., AN 300). The B&E Business Minor now accepts B&E 105 as a substitute for CS 101. We wish simply to change our program requirements to reflect that AEC majors may also take either B&E 105 or CS 101 in preparation for their Business Minor. Attached is an email from Scott Kelley (Associate Dean for Undergraduate Affairs in the Gatton College of Business and Economics) endorsing this AEC program change and certifying that B&E 105 is/will be open to AEC majors.

Undergraduate Curriculum Committee meeting minutes, April 21, 2017.

Voting members in attendance: Brown, Crofcheck, Geneve, Haynes, Jacobsen, Lee, Lhotka, McNear, Vincent.

Non-voting members in attendance: Gladstone, Grabau.

Guests from the college in attendance: Hunter

Agenda Item #1: First reading of new B.S. program in Consumer Economics and Personal Finance as submitted by the Department of Family Sciences. This program proposal, along with ten new courses, was presented by Jennifer Hunter. A robust discussion ensued. One faculty line will be reallocated from the Couple and Family Therapy MS program to this new B.S. program (thus, no new resources are being requested). The program title (as shown above) should match exactly throughout the submitted documents. There was some conversation of how the required minor would match up with the college's expectation for specialty support and the total requirement for 300-level hours (45 such hours). Some details within the documentation were also raised as potential questions for the second reading by the UCC. A question was raised about academic expectations with respect to the family sciences B.S. program; in general, the expectations are intended to be higher (e.g., relevant to "C" or higher for ECO 201 and perhaps to FAM 350 and FAM 351 as well). A clarification was sought regarding the philosophy of the new program; that is, is the program to be about "consumer advising" (financial wealth management) or about "consumer counseling" (family helping professionals). The sense of the conversation was that the latter was the intention of the faculty. There was a question whether this should be a B.A. or a B.S. (as is available in the College of Arts and Sciences). The UCC wondered how students would "find" this program; Hunter's response was two-fold: i) they hope for new first-year students to be attracted to the program, and ii) they do anticipate internal and external transfers to the program. The UCC also asked about any potential impact on enrollments in other programs; since this is a novel program, Hunter does not anticipate a dramatic impact on any existing programs. Some conversation centered on the idea of requiring multiple internships and how those experiences would be described. Another discussion was about how the use of the Academic Exploration Tool might help/hinder students from finding this new major, depending on how well the keyword searches were configured. There was some discussion about the need for a separate track for students intent on AFC certification, and whether non-AFC students would be as employable as AFC ones. Finally, the issue of actual free electives came up; it seems that this is a complex calculation that may need some ironing out. We did begin to discuss the courses; some technical issues will need to be addressed (course descriptions to match between Curriculog forms and syllabi; measurable/high order student learning outcomes. We anticipate revisiting the program, as well as the courses, at the very outset of the fall semester.

Agenda Item #2: fast-tracking AEC 101 as a UKC UK Core course; discussion led by Brown. The goal of this course would be to recruit students to the AGECEC major by

engaging them in an interesting course during their first year on campus (currently AGECE students, whether in the major or not, do not have such a course). Some years ago, AEC 101 worked well in the University Studies Program to serve this purpose. The program plans to rotate faculty through this course in order to give prospective students an opportunity to meet an array of AGECE faculty. One UCC suggestion was to consider a name for the course that was broader than “agriculture” (perhaps, agriculture, food and environment?) in order to broaden its appeal. The second student learning outcome was questioned as perhaps trying to cover too much ground. The use of a “card game” discussion model seemed to perhaps be cumbersome for a course with rotating faculty; the instructor of record would manage that seamlessly behind the scenes. Lee moved to approve (with minor modifications), Vincent seconded and the UCC approved by an 8-0 vote. Note that since this course is to be offered as a UKC course (to provide UK Core credit), college and UK Core approvals were the only two approvals necessary.

Agenda Item #3: Departmental Honors for AGECE, effective Fall 2017; discussion led by Brown. Vincent moved to approve, Lee seconded, UCC approved 8-0.

Agenda Item #4: Minor course changes, discussion led by Brown. Prerequisites for eight AEC courses (AEC 301, 324, 325, 326, 340, 422, 441G, and 471), all minor course changes, were discussed. Lee moved to approve, Geneve seconded, and the UCC approved by an 8-0 vote.

Agenda Item #5: AGECE B.S. program change proposal, presented by Brown; consisted of three major portions—

- Only one of the three law courses (AEC 324, 325, or 326) will be allowed toward the 9 credits of elective AEC courses at the 300-level.
- Significant tightening of the prefixes from which specialty support courses may be drawn for both the Ag Econ and Business Management options.
- Allowing Business Management option students to choose from B&E 105 or CS 101 toward their required business minor.

Lee moved to approve; McNear seconded and the UCC approved by an 8-0 vote.


