INTERDISCIPLINARY PROGRAMS

Requirements for the B.A. with a major in ARTS ADMINISTRATION

With the increase in the number of performing and visual arts facilities, arts councils and arts advocacy groups, there is a growing need for individuals with both artistic sensibilities and business acumen to work in these organizations. Through the arts administration program, students take classes in the disciplines of art, dance, music, and theatre, plus a wide range of courses related to the business management of nonprofit arts organizations. The program prepares students for entry-level management positions in arts organizations and for graduate study.

Admission

To be admitted into the Arts Administration Program as a major, an applicant must first:

- 1. be enrolled in the University of Kentucky:
- 2. complete 45 semester hours of course work:
- have a minimum 2.8 cumulative gradepoint average;
- complete premajor core requirements (AAD 200 and 202, and one of the following: COM 181, COM 287, TA 225), plus ACC 201 and ECO 201 with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.0; and
- 5. submit an application form.

Students meeting these requirements will be accepted as majors in the program. Applications for admission must be submitted before the end of the semester prior to a student taking an upper division Arts Administration course.

Students who want to be a major, but have not met one or more of the above requirements will be designated as "premajors." There is no application procedure for students to become Arts Administration premajors. Upon their request, premajors will be assigned Arts Administration advisors and folders will be created for them.

RATIONALE FOR CHANGES

Over the past several years, the faculty of the Department of Theatre have brainstormed, researched, and developed a revised curriculum. The B.A. Degree in Theatre program updates will bring cutting edge changes to the curriculum, including multi-cultural, international, and community outreach courses, that will align the Department of Theatre with its benchmarks and provide student opportunities for learning that will allow them to compete in the 21st century marketplace.

The program is strongly oriented toward interdisciplinary participation and collaboration. Theater Program courses emphasize the truly inclusive nature of theater, which encompasses performance, literature, design, history, artistic community, and intellectual rigor. Students are expected to acquire a solid familiarity with dramatic literature and to develop the ability to research the historical context and dramaturgy of a play and to write about it. They are also encouraged to Study Abroad in two programs currently being developed in coordination with Asian Theatre and French Theatre. In addition, students will have increased opportunities for Community Engagement by involving them in Social Action Theatre projects across the Commonwealth.

CHANGES IN DEGREE PROGRAMS

During the academic year 2005-2006, the Department of Theatre decided to suspend its B.F.A Degree programs for a number of reasons. First, B.F.A. Programs, in general were extremely popular in the 1980's, when many Universities were first implementing them as a "conservatory" style degree option. Over the past twenty-five years, M.F.A. degrees have become vital for actors going into the field of design and/or performance, subsequently the B.F.A. in Theatre has become outmoded and superfluous.

An article in the *New York Times* (Dec. 15, 2005) described the B.F.A. syndrome eloquently, in that many B.F.A. programs are showcasing their graduating acting students in New York City in order to find representation and acting employment. But Casting Directors and agents conclude that B.F.A. Acting students are less desirable to them. These theatre professionals are more interested in young actors who are well read, well traveled, and curious about the world. In other words, a B.A. degree is the more desirable degree in order to compete in the world of theatre arts in the 21st Century.

Similarly, Professor Susan Hilferty, who heads the Graduate Design Program at NYU, describes her disillusionment with typical undergraduate theatre majors, who have devoted an inordinate amount of time in their education to practice-oriented coursework. Professors from several graduate design programs of the highest caliber concur with her sentiment. In an October 1999 article in *Entertainment Design*, Ming Cho Lee from Yale School of Drama states that he is, "...looking for a [potential graduate] student with an understanding of history, literature, and curiosity about life. A young student who has a broad-based liberal arts education to connect to the life, the history, the society, the

human experience." These are the qualities that the Department of Theatre intends to cultivate through the revisions in the B.A. Degree curriculum.

In addition, the Department of Theatre has approximately 70-80 majors, and a faculty of 12. Our resources were not being utilized equitably or efficiently given the small number of majors in the B.F.A. Degree Programs.

Consequently, with these curriculum revisions, we will focus our Departmental energy on a B.A. Degree that will allow theatre students more freedom of choice through categories of electives, and will allow them to devise an individual plan of study based on their areas of interest.

CATEGORIES OF CHANGE

Change in Existing Courses

Courses in this section have subtle changes to course content that align them more powerfully to the B.A. Degree revisions.

Dropped Courses

By suspending the B.F.A. Degree Programs, the Department of Theatre is removing courses from our curriculum list that deal with topics that are too narrow in focus for a B.A. Degree, have a small number of students who were required to take them under old degree programs, or have outmoded course content.

Added Courses

The Department of Theatre is adding courses under several categories:

- Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior Studios
 - These courses will be collaborative learning environments that will incorporate aspects of theory, practice and performance. Senior Studio will be a capstone course, which will have a Reading List of Dramatic Literature and a Comprehensive Written Test to accurately assess our graduating seniors knowledge of Dramatic Literature and Theatre.
- World Theatre 1, 2, 3, and 4
 - These courses will replace Theatre History 1 and 2, which focused mainly on the Western European Theatre tradition. In the new World Theatre courses, students will gain a stronger multi-cultural and international perspective. World Theatre 1 will be a provisional major course, which students must pass with a 3.0 or higher. World Theatre 2 and 3 will be major requirements, and World Theatre 4 can be taken as an elective under the category of Theory and History.
- Performance and Practice Electives
 - In addition to Studio Performance courses, students can opt to take other courses in this area that include: Advanced Acting, Directing, and Playwriting. The Advanced Directing course (TA 530) will be a research-based course, which will allow students to focus on the individual styles of influential theatre directors, and create performance projects based on their research. The playwriting program will be increased to include a second, more advanced playwriting course, and the faculty member who heads this

area will also direct the Studio Season, where student written and directed plays are produced each semester.

Design and Technology Electives

New courses include: TA 368, Visual Storytelling, which is a design class focused on puppetry, mask-making and mythology; and TA 360, Graphics for Theatre, which will focus on computer aided drawing and advanced rendering and drawing skills for theatre students.

• Theory and History Electives

Several of the courses in this category have been offered in the past as Topics in Theatre courses with a variety of subtitles. The Department desires to formalize its commitment to multi-cultural, international and cross-disciplinary courses by offering these classes on a regular basis. Examples of courses are Black Theatre Workshop, Asian Theatre, French Theatre and Social Action Theatre.

CHANGES IN MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

Provisional Major Requirements

The Changes in Major Requirements are outlined on the last page of this document. There are two provisional major requirements, which students need to complete with a 3.0 in order to become full theatre majors. The first is TA 115, or Freshman Studio. This course will be an introduction to many aspects of Theatre Practice and Performance, and will be team-taught by two Theatre Faculty. The content of the course (which will meet five days per week) will encompass the material formerly taught in TA 126 and TA 150. In addition to the content contained in those classes, the new course will give greater focus to ensemble building and creating a collaborative group project each semester. Also, a third faculty member will lecture during specific class sessions on Make-Up for Theatre, which was formerly taught as TA 264. By embedding Make-up for Theatre into the Studio Class, students learn about these techniques within the context of the project they are working on, so they can apply them immediately rather than in academic isolation.

The Department of Theatre will continue to offer TA 126 (Fundamentals of Acting) and TA 150 (Fundamentals of Design and Production) under the revised curriculum. These classes are often taken by students outside the Department of Theatre as electives, and will continue to be useful in terms of recruiting students. In order for the class size in Freshman Studio to remain at 20 students, Theatre Minors will also take TA 126 and TA 150 for their degree requirements.

TA 171, World Theatre 1, will also be required for incoming freshmen students to complete with a 3.0 or higher in order to become Theatre Majors. In this way, the Department can encourage students to link theory, history and practice as they strive for excellence in their academic endeavors.

Students will take a total of 11 credit hours as provisional theatre majors.

Major Requirements

Many of the major requirements have stayed the same under the curriculum revisions. Students take a total of 38 credit hours that are major requirements. Only one new course is submitted, although it is currently being taught under a Topics in Theatre listing. TA 275, Stage Management, will be a major requirement. It is a crucial course for all theater majors as it deals with organization, problem solving, leadership skills, and an overall knowledge of all aspects of theatre.

Electives

Under the revised program, Theatre Majors are required to take at least one course (3 credit hours) from each of the following categories of electives:

- Practice and Performance
- · Design and Technology
- Theory and History

They are required to take a total of 24 credit hours from these three elective categories, so by shifting the focus of the curriculum to include more electives, students are able to design a program that suits their individual needs, interests, and abilities.

CONCLUSION

The Theater Program is grounded in the belief that theater is a fundamental cultural necessity that enriches all who participate in it. The program emphasizes the practical and the theoretical, and is geared toward students who are interested in theater as a part of a liberal arts education and those who might wish to pursue further professional training or a career in theater.

The revisions in the B.A. Degree curriculum will create a cutting-edge program for the Commonwealth. The concept of collaboration behind the focus of the program is innovative and will bring new vigor to students and faculty.

The proposed curriculum will support the Mission and Strategic Plan of the Department of Theatre, which are directly in alignment with the University-wide goals for excellence.
