14. Rationale for Change(s) – if rationale involves accreditation requirements, please include specific references to that.

In response to the NCATE Blue Ribbon Panel on Clinical Preparation and Partnerships for Improved Student Learning, in response to challenges from Senate Bill 1, and in response to changes in university studies, we have spent the past year realigning our courses with national standards and creating a program centered on clinical practice. In this new clinical model, every course provides our middle-level teacher candidates with the opportunity to work in a program fully grounded in clinical practice.

In addition, we have changed the name of our program from Middle SCHOOL Teacher Education to Middle LEVEL Teacher Education. This is in keeping with an important shift in the field. Just as the National Middle School Association is now named the Association for Middle Level Education, we prepare professional educators to work with young adolescents, grades 5-9, no matter how a school may be configured.

In this new clinical model, for instance, science majors will now spend at least 8 more weeks apprenticing with master science teachers. They will have additional coursework in science pedagogy, and the discipline-specific coursework listed above is now aligned with the new Common Core Standards as well as the standards for Initial Teacher Preparation recommended by the National Science Teachers Association.

The same is now true for math majors, social studies majors, and English language arts majors. In each of the academic hours, revisions were made by a team of key constituent partners with the approval of our colleagues in Arts and Sciences and in accordance with national teacher education standards outlined by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, National Council of Social Studies, and National Council of Teachers of English, respectively.

Middle Level Teacher Education students, all of whom have TWO academic majors, will finally graduate from our four-year degree program in less than five years. More importantly, they will be well prepared to effectively teach their two subjects in middle grades classrooms with all kinds of learners. In 2015, we

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anticipate full NCATE accreditation, as well as state approval from EPSB, and for the first time in our program's history, we plan to apply for and receive additional Specialized Professional Associations (SPA) approval from the professional organizations listed above.
