14. Rationale for Change(s) – if rationale involves accreditation requirements, please include specific references to that.

In 2008 our accreditation body (Council on Social Work Education) implemented new standards which included a transition to competency based education. We concluded as a result of faculty discussions and review of assessment data that to effectively incorporate the numerous required competencies and practice behaviors (learning outcomes) and provide students with opportunities to apply and demonstrate proficiency in acquired knowledge and skills, it was necessary to develop these additional social work major courses. The implementation of the new General Education program also necessitated a review of the BASW pre-major requirements in light of our program goals and learning outcomes. Pre-major requirement proposed as additions to the BASW curriculum faculty assessed as providing our students with foundational skills important to their success as social work majors and professionals. The BIO 102 is proposed as a dropped requirement following a discussion with Dr. Ruth Beattie, Biology DUS, and a review of the syllabus, as BIO 103 or BIO 110 appear to be the most applicable courses relevant to the new accreditation requirements and program learning outcomes.

In 2008 our accrediting body, the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE), revised the Educational Policy and Accreditation Standards (EPAS) that govern accredited social work programs. EPAS 2008 requires programs to transition from a content-focused program to one that is competency-based and includes ongoing assessment. CSWE has prescribed ten competencies for which undergraduate programs are responsible and delineated practice behaviors (or learning outcomes) for each practice behavior. These competencies and learning outcomes are addressed throughout the curriculum and are distributed throughout social work courses (as appropriate) for the objectives of each course. I have include a list of the practice behaviors (learning outcomes) that we are expected to address as part of this cover letter. These changes that have occurred nationally in social work education along with the soon to be implemented Gen Ed revision, created an opportunity for faculty to re-conceptualize the BASW curriculum.

Course changes were informed by various mechanisms. An audit of our curriculum via development of a curriculum matrix assisted the faculty in determining areas in which our social work curriculum needed to be enhanced to better prepare our students to develop proficiency in these competency areas. We collected our first year of program assessment data evaluating student performance on each practice behavior and competency. Faculty then reviewed these data and used these findings to inform curriculum change. We also conducted an alumni survey and conducted student focus groups and utilized these qualitative findings during our discussions.

- (1) The faculty concluded that the BASW curriculum needed to enhance the social work major practice-sequence as the curriculum matrix showed there was a deficit of material focused on groupwork. Adding a third practice course allowed for the removal of minimal content on groups from the other two practice courses, which increased opportunities for application in those courses and allowed the program to more fully address Competency 2.1.10, which focuses on the development of practice skills at all levels, through the provision of three practice courses. (*Action:* addition of a new course: SW 350, minor change of changing title of SW 400)
- (2) Quantitative and qualitative assessment data showed we needed to focus more fully on integration of human behavior and social environment theories in practice and provide for their application. Competency 2.1.7, "Apply knowledge of human behavior and the social environment," requires specific learning outcomes related to this area. (*Action:* addition of new courses SW 421 and SW 422; drop SW 420)

- (3) SW 460 was conceptualized to address Competency 2.1.4, which requires students to be able to "engage diversity and difference in practice," in relation to the previously discussed Competency 2.1.7 and Competency 2.1.10. The curriculum audit showed this material was lacking and the addition of this course further enhances students' ability to apply theory to inform interventions within the scope of their level of practice. (*Action:* addition of a new course: SW 460)
- (4) Competency 2.1.3 focuses on application of critical thinking skills and Competency 2.1.6 focuses on engagement in research as related to practice. Assessment data showed students scoring at benchmark in the aggregate, but the percentage of students reaching the benchmark score on each program measure could be improved. Faculty sought to strengthen foundational skills in critical thinking and quantitative reasoning to prepare for future social work courses such as research, theory, ethics, and the capstone course. (*Action:* Add PHI 120 and MA 109 as new pre-major requirements, drop BIO 102)
- (5) Competency 2.1.2 is focused on "applying social work ethical principles to social work practice." A discrete ethics course was added to the BASW curriculum in 2008 but students have consistently requested that the course be 3 credit hours rather than 2. With the new emphasis on application, the need for the credit increase and course revision is enhanced. (*Action:* Increase SW 435 credit hours from 2 to 3)
