I have attached the paperwork for a set of changes in the Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership. The proposed changes include the following: (1) move the Agricultural Education option from this degree program to the program in Career and Technical Education, (2) change the name of the program to Community Communications and Leadership Development, (3) create a series of new required courses which will both strengthen the program and make it less dependent on courses from other departments, (4) cross-list a number of courses with the Department of Sociology and the School of Journalism, (5) formalize achievement criteria for majors, (6) establish a minor in Community Communications and Leadership Development, and (7) change the prefix of all courses associated with the program to CLD. The background for these changes, as well as the rationale for each, follows.

Background

The creation of the Department of Community & Leadership Development in 2002 brought together faculty from rural sociology, agricultural communications, program and staff development, and agricultural education. The Department also became the academic home for the Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership which, until that time, had been an interdisciplinary College degree without a departmental affiliation. The Department, in general, and its Undergraduate Committee, in particular, has spent considerable time and effort over the last two years examining ways our new configuration of faculty and other resources can be used to strengthen our undergraduate and graduate programs. These proposals, which were unanimously approved by the Department in October, are an outcome of those efforts.

Move Agricultural Education Option

Currently, Community & Leadership Development has one undergraduate degree program (Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership) with options in Agricultural Education, Agricultural Communications, and Public Service and Leadership. While there had once been considerable overlap in professional development requirements of the three options, the academic and professional goals of the three are not as well served by a common major set of courses today as in the past. While the Agricultural Communications and Public Service and Leadership options share the commonality of being interdisciplinary social science programs, the Agricultural Education option is focused primarily on preparing students for certification as teachers in the public schools. With the incorporation of the former College of Human Environmental Sciences into the College of Agriculture as a School of Human Environmental Sciences in 2003, the College became the home of a second teacher certification program in Family and Consumer Sciences Education, which is one option in the Family and Consumer Sciences program whose academic home is in the Department of Family Studies. Since Agricultural Education and Family and Consumer Sciences Education currently share a focus on teacher certification and much of their curriculum and teaching resources, a separate proposal to combine them into one program in Career and Technical Education is being submitted jointly by the Departments of Family Studies and Community & Leadership Development.

Re-name the Program Community Communications and Leadership Development

Dropping the degree's Agricultural Education option necessitates changing the name of the Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership program. The proposed Community Communications and Leadership Development title reflects both the home Department of Community & Leadership Development's name and the faculty expertise in community and rural sociology now available to support the program.

Create a Series of New Required Courses

In preparing this proposal, our faculty outlined the core competencies we feel majors need to develop by the time they graduate. After doing so, we looked at our current course offerings and identified a need for four new required courses which will enhance those student competencies. These required courses will replace a number of currently required courses offered by other departments. In addition to enhancing our students' experiences, the addition of these courses within our department will have the benefit of assuring students access to the courses they need to for timely progression through the program.

Cross-List Courses

Two of the four new courses being proposed as part of the major's core requirements (i.e., CLD 340, CLD 440) will have a strong sociological focus and will be taught by department faculty with sociological training who have joint appointments in the Department of Sociology. Sociology has approved cross-listing them. A third course, CLD/SOC 420 Sociology of Community, also will be cross-listed. The formal request to cross-list and rename that course, whose current title is Community Analysis, has been

initiated by the Department of Sociology in the College of Arts and Sciences. In addition to cross-listings with Sociology, we are proposing to cross-list three courses with the School of Journalism. Agricultural Communications students are currently required to take all three and will continue to do so in the revised program. At the current time, our department provides the School of Journalism with funds to hire a PTI to teach one section of JOU 204 and one section of JOU 301 for our students each year. In addition, one of our faculty members has taught JOU 485 on a number of occasions since the School of Journalism was not offering the course on a regular basis. We have consulted with Journalism and the School supports formalizing our collaboration by cross-listing those three courses and is initiating the formal request to do so.

Formalize Achievement Criteria

As part of this major curriculum revision, we have had extensive discussions of the need to establish achievement criteria for our majors. Based upon the history and past performance of our majors, we have elected not to establish criteria (e.g., minimum GPA) for entrance into the major as many other programs at the University have done. However, we are proposing instead criteria for student performance after officially joining the program.

Establish a Minor in Community Communication and Leadership Development

We do not offer a minor in the current Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership program. Our revised program will become more focused, allowing us to establish a coherent combination of courses to constitute a Community Communications and Leadership Development minor.

Change Course Prefixes to CLD

A final aspect of this proposal is a request to change the prefix for courses associated with the program from ACE to CLD. The change will better reflect the new program and the Department. It will also bring the prefix into alignment with the prefix associated with a proposed Community and Leadership Development option in our graduate program which is currently under consideration in the Graduate Council.

It is important to note that the program revisions we are requesting incorporate and are consistent with new College requirements currently being implemented.

Finally, in conjunction with this curriculum revision the department has also reviewed the DOEs of faculty in terms of current and proposed new courses and teaching loads. With some minor adjustments in DOEs we are prepared to teach the curriculum with our current faculty resources.

The revisions presented here reflect the following proposed changes in the Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership degree as well as proposed changes in the Family and Consumer Sciences – Option B (Teacher Certification) degree.

Create two undergraduate degrees:

Community Communications and Leadership Development:

Option A - Agricultural Communications

Option B - Public Service and Leadership

Formerly the Agricultural Communications and Leadership options within the Agricultural Communications, Education and Leadership undergraduate degree

Career and Technical Education:

Option A - Agricultural Education

Option B - Family and Consumer Sciences Education

Formerly the Agricultural Education option within the Agricultural Communications, Education and Leadership undergraduate degree and the Family and Consumer Sciences teaching certification option within Family Studies

Create a new curriculum for Community Communications and Leadership Development

Revise the current Agricultural Education, Communications and Leadership curriculum and introduce 4 new courses (see new course proposals) to strengthen the knowledge and skill development of the program based on a formal list of core competencies that anchors the core curriculum (see attachment).

This process also involves:

Aligning the curriculum with proposed changes in College of Agriculture graduation requirements;

Renumbering some courses;

Linking a new prefix to courses (CLD) to connect the undergraduate program to both the department and a revised graduate program;

Introducing pre-requisites for courses where appropriate;

Recognizing changing professional/career expectations and so, revising the option requirements to reflect changing opportunities within professional fields;

Introducing a "Contract for Academic Excellence" (see attachment) which establishes academic performance expectations for students in the program and the consequences of failure to meet program expectations; and

Establishing a new minor (see attachment).

Justification

While there was once a considerable amount of overlap in the professional development requirements of the three options currently offered under the Agricultural Education, Communications, and Leadership degree, these are increasingly diverging. As the program has developed and students have graduated and gone on to professional schools or careers, it is clear that the core set of competencies (knowledge and skills) required for those pursuing the Agricultural Communications and the Public Service and Leadership options differ in critical ways from the competencies for those seeking teaching certification in Agricultural Education. For example, while the Agricultural Communications and the Public Service and Leadership options shared the commonality of being interdisciplinary social science programs, the Agricultural Education option was focused primarily on preparing students to achieve teacher certification so that they could teach in high school career and technical education programs. Thus, it became apparent that the academic and professional goals of the three options were no longer well served by a common major set of courses. Once this was agreed to, the Agricultural Communications and the Public Service and Leadership faculty, in consultation with others:

Developed individually, a list of core concepts and competencies essential for successful placement of graduates of their option;

Determined that there was sufficient overlap in the core competencies of both programs to merit a single degree with two options;

Identified courses appropriate to the development of these competencies and designed 4 new courses to create a focused and coherent core; and

Completed revisions of the Agricultural Communications and Public Service and Leadership options to strengthen attainment of educational and professional development goals.

Justification for changes in Agricultural Communications Option:

The Agricultural Communications option provides students with a community/rural/agricultural/ natural resource perspective on communications. Students who graduate with this degree are prepared to move into a variety of positions with agricultural commodity groups, local and state agencies supporting the agricultural industry, agribusinesses and related groups, community newspapers, and magazines and other periodicals focusing on agriculture, the environment, and related topics.

The proposed changes in the program requirements for this option reflect several priorities:

The need to strengthen the option by the addition of courses more specific to our field of study and more tailored to the needs of our students (the program shifts from 7 ACE courses [old prefix] to 13 CLD courses [new prefix];

The desire for independence from the College of Communications and Information Studies. Instead of requiring four courses with the JOU prefix and two courses with the COM prefix, the program will now have one introductory JOU course, and three courses cross-listed with JOU (taught equally by faculty in CLD); and

The need for courses that will prepare students for advanced work in the Community Communications track of the revised non-teaching option of the masters' degree program in Career, Technical and Leadership Education.

Justification for changes in Public Service and Leadership Option:

The Public Service and Leadership Option is designed to provide students with an interdisciplinary social science perspective on agricultural and natural resource issues. The student is expected to be able to address critical agricultural or natural resource issues using concepts and tools from various social science disciplinary perspectives. Thus, the components of the PSL option reflect core competencies (knowledge and skills) that will enable the students to move into a variety of positions in public or private organizations in the agricultural or natural resources industry and/or local/state governments.

The proposed changes in the program requirements for this option reflect two realities. First, there are several courses within the University that offer different perspectives on the same knowledge or skill base (e.g., What are the psychological processes underlying organizational functioning? What are the psychological processes influencing political behavior?). While all students in this option should have an understanding of psychological processes, the exact perspective that most contributes to the professional development of the student depends on the student's long-term professional goals. The flexibility of some of the option requirements will enable the students, in consultation with their advisor, to develop a program that enhances their knowledge and skills in appropriate ways. Second, given the personnel changes in departments, it is difficult to maintain the integrity of a program when specific courses are required. Rather, identifying competency areas (e.g., understanding psychological processes, understanding organizational dynamics) and then noting that several courses address a particular competency area ensures that changes in the course offerings of particular departments do not create barriers to the timely completion of a degree.
