The College of Agriculture is forwarding the following curriculum proposals.

- 1. A change in the undergraduate degree in Hospitality Management and Tourism. This change is primarily to reflect changes in courses within the program which are listed below.
- 2. New Course
 - a. HMT 360 Tourism Planning and Development. This will be a new course which will satisfy a major elective requirement in the HMT program.
- 3. Change Course
 - a. HMT 208 to HMT 308 Principles of Food and Beverage. Designed to move this course into a higher level of learning, later in the course of study.

These changes were all approved unanimously by the College of Agriculture UG Curriculum Committee on 10/31/2007 and by the College Faculty on 12/6/2007.
