CLA 625: Seminar in the Latin Literature of the Empire SAMPLE SYLLABUS

Virgil's Aeneid

We shall all read *Aeneid* I, II, IV, X, and XII. Our principal narrative concerns will be Aeneas and Dido and Aeneas in combat. Our interpretive and aesthetic interests will encompass a broad range of topics: form, theme, characterization, syntax, diction, prosody, imagery, historical context, and Hellenic influence. We shall also examine several examples of Augustan sculpture in connection with our aesthetic and historical interests.

Your responsibilities in our joint endeavor will be:

- 1. To be prepared to scan, to read aloud in Latin, and to translate into English the assigned readings.
- 2. To be prepared to comment thoughtfully on the literary features of the poetry that we read.
- 3. To memorize and be prepared to both recite and write out in Latin the opening 33 verses of the *Aeneid*.
- 4. To keep the Latin text you use in class completely free from lexical and grammatical notes.
- 5. To attend class regularly and to inform me of any special circumstances that may force you to be absent.
- 6. To write two (mutually exclusive) examinations, one at mid-term and the other at the end of the course. (These examinations will involve translation, scansion, and syntax.)
- 7. To write a seminar paper, due before taking the final exam, on a mutually agreeable topic.

Course grades will be determined as follows:

Class performance, 35%; performance on the two common examinations, 35%; memorization performance, 10%; seminar paper, 20%. To be eligible for a course grade of A, you must earn a grade of at least B on your seminar paper.

All grades for this course will be assigned according to the Graduate School grading system, i.e. letters only (A, B, C, no +/-, the grade of D is not available to graduate students).
