The Orations of Demosthenes

Course Content and Reading Schedule

We will read in Greek, and be examined on, the *Olynthiacs, Philippics I-III*, the speech *On the Peace*, and Plutarch's *Life of Demosthenes* according to the following schedule:

August 28 (M): *Philippic I*, 1-12

October 9 (M): On the Peace, 1-12

October 11 (W): 13-25

October 16 (M) and 18 (W): examination on the orations listed above

October 23 (M): Philippic II, 1-19

October 25 (W): 20-37

October 30 (M): Philippic III, 1-16

November 1 (W): 17-35 November 6 (M): 36-56 November 8 (W): 57-76

November 13 (M), 15 (W), 20 (M), 22 (W), 27 (M), 29 (W); December 4 (M), 6 (W): Plutarch's *Demosthenes* (four Teubner pages per class)

December 13 (W): examination on *Philippic III* and the *Demosthenes*

We will thus be reading Plutarch's biographical presentation of Demosthenes' character and conduct against the background tapestry provided by an ample selection of the great orator's political speeches. Our historical focus will be on Philip and the Athenians, on Demosthenes' public policy, and on the demise of Greek *eleutheria*. Our literary concerns will be chiefly in the areas of rhetorical technique and biographical methodology. We will also undertake to solidify our knowledge of Greek syntax.

Your Responsibilities

- 1. To be prepared to read aloud in Greek and translate into English the assigned readings.
- 2. To be prepared to comment thoughtfully on their historical content and literary features.
- 3. To be prepared to indicate the first principal part and explain the syntax of the verb forms we encounter in our reading.
- 4. To keep the Greek text you use in class completely free from lexical and grammatical notes and, if you keep a vocabulary list, to put it away before class begins.
- 5. To attend class regularly and inform me of any special circumstances that may force you to be absent.
- 6. To write the two (mutually exclusive) examinations listed in the reading schedule. These examinations will involve translation and, to a lesser extent, syntactical explanation and the identification of first principal parts.
- 7. To write a seminar paper on a mutually agreed upon topic, due before taking the final examination

Determination of Course Grades

Class performance, 40%; performance on the two examinations, 40%; performance on the seminar paper, 20 %. To be eligible for a course grade of A, you must earn a grade of at least B on the seminar paper.

All grades will be assigned as letters: A, B, C, E (there is no D in the graduate school grade scale). For purposes of calculation, these will correspond to the usual scale of:

$$A = 4 \text{ points} \quad B = 3 \quad C = 2 \quad E = 0.$$

For the final course grade, points will average according to the percentages above and final grades will given on the following scale:
