COURSE DESCRIPTION

An independent investigation of a topic, usually outside of or in considerably greater depth than available in the regular course offerings, in Greek and/or Roman language, literature, history, or culture. The course is designed for advanced undergraduate students under the supervision of a faculty member, and usually takes the form of directed readings, writing, and discussion, with tutorial meetings with the instructor no less than once a week. An advanced undergraduate research paper or equivalent project is the standard product of the course. May be repeated to a maximum of 6 credits.

PREREQUISITE

Advanced undergraduate experience in Classics and permission of the instructor.

Student LEARNING OUTCOMES

Student GENERALIZED LEARNING OUTCOMES: CLA 495: Undergraduate Independent Study

Since this course is an independent study, only generic outcomes can be specified for the course as a whole. The sample syllabus gives an example of how these will be applied to specific instances of the course.

At the conclusion of this course, the student should be able to:

- Discourse knowledgeably on an advanced undergraduate level concerning a specific topic in Greek or Roman language, literature, history, or culture.
- Identify and use the major research sources on the specific topic, including standard bibliographies, both print and on-line, databases of articles, print and on-line journals, and the major sources in ancient literature, art, or archaeology pertinent to the topic of study.
- Compile a working bibliography of the sources on this topic, and related topics in the same general area.
- Produce a research paper or equivalent project on the topic at an advanced undergraduate level.

At the conclusion of this sample course the student should be able to:

- Identify the major heroic figures in Greek mythology and discourse knowledgeably about them on an advanced undergraduate level.
- Identify and use the major research sources on the specific heroes of Greek mythology and the heroic tradition, including standard bibliographies, both print and on-line, databases of articles, print and on-line journals, and the major sources in ancient literature, art, or archaeology.
- Compile a working bibliography of the sources on the major Greek heroes and the Greek heroic tradition.
- Produce a research paper, at an advanced undergraduate level, concerning one or more of the Greek heroes or some aspect of the Greek heroic tradition, which will take into account artistic or archaeological as well as literary sources.

COURSE SUMMARY & GOALS

This independent study will be organized around the heroic figures emerging from the literary sources of Greek mythology. In addition to examining the identity and character of individual heroes, the course will also examine the concept of the "hero" as it evolved in the literature and trace its influences and appearances art, archaeology, and religion.

COURSE MATERIALS

The fundamental text for the course will be: Kerényi, C. *The Heroes of the Greeks*. New York: Thames and Hudson, 1959. As the course progresses, the student will read other sources, obtained from the library, as directed by the instructor.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

The requirements for the course include two exams, a paper, and satisfactory participation. The exams will cover the material covered in each half of the course. The paper should be at least 15 pages and examine some aspect of the subject under study.

COURSE GRADING

Your course grade will be determined according to the following percentages: midterm, 25%; final, 25%; paper, 30%, preparation and participation, 20%.

Scores will be assigned based on the following standards:

FINAL EXAM

There will be no cumulative final exam for the course; the two exams for the course will cover material in the first and second halves respectively. The second exam for the course will take place during the scheduled final exam period: **Tuesday, December 13th, 10:30-12:30**, but, again, will only cover the second half of the course. The paper submitted at the end of the course will constitute the "capstone" for the course.

Since this is an independent study, you are expected to show up for all sessions, with assignments completed and prepared to discuss the material. Some absences are, of course, unavoidable, these include, per Senate Rules 5.2.4.2:

An independent study requires a far higher level of individual responsibility form the student.
