APPLICATION FOR NEW COURSE CLM 350: HEALTH POLICY AND POLITICS COURSE OUTLINE

COURSE GOAL

To enhance a student's ability to discuss and participate in the political process of establishing US health policy in an informed and anialytical manner.

COURSE RATIONALE

This course will address the development of past and current US health policy within the context of historical, economic, cultural, and political environments. The political process and the roles and responsibilities of the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of government will be examined. The power and influence that politics, money, the media, and special interest groups have had, and continue to have, upon the development of national and state health policies will be discussed and analyzed.

MAJOR OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Critically articulate the history of our health care system and the primary forces that influenced its evolution.
- Knowledgeably discuss our national health status and be able to critically articulate and analyze the continuing challenges of health access and health disparities, particularly among our minority populations
- 3. Critically articulate the legislative process and the challenges of health policy implementation.
- 4. Explain the major federal and state-funded health care programs and initiatives, and their associated strengths and weaknesses.
- 5. Explain the economics and financing of health care and be able to critically compare and evaluate the various funding streams.
- Critically analyze and compare current health care reform proposals and the politics and influence of money, power, and special interest groups through written assignments and the successful participation in class activities (i.e., mock congressional hearings).
- Explain the major public health, prevention, and health promotion initiatives, and the rationales supporting them.
- 8. Discuss and analyze America's ethical obligations and responsibilities regarding global health issues.

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

- Class attendance and participation
- Completion of assigned reading and homework assignments
- Successful completion of 2 exams
- Participation in two mock congressional hearings in which students will be assigned to one of several groups that represent various special interests. Testimony must be prepared and presented to mock legislators (following legislative procedural protocols). In addition, each student must write a 3-4 page reflection paper for each of the two hearings. The paper is to include an analysis of the issue being discussed and the position and supporting rationale for each of the special interest groups that are affected. One hearing will focus on a federal health care issue and the second hearing will focus on a Kentucky health care issue.
