COURSE DESCRIPTION

Bulletin Description:

An overview of the Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology profession(s) including aspects of professional practice, areas of specialization, professional issues and trends, and career paths and opportunities. The course will consist of assignments, lectures and interactive discussions led by faculty and visiting professionals designed to expand students' understanding of the profession(s) and to assist in educational and career planning and discernment.

Student Learning Outcomes:

The purpose of this course is to provide students with a broad understanding of the Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology profession(s) including general areas of practice responsibilities and specialization, important issues and trends, and career paths and opportunities.

Upon completion of this course, the successful student will:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of the careers within communication sciences and disorders
- 2. Describe the general differences between the professions of audiology and speechlanguage pathology
- 3. Discuss two to three areas of interest within communication sciences and disorders and explain why those are of particular interest.

Required Readings:

Students will be expected to review assigned materials selected by the instructor from websites such as the following:

- American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (http://www.asha.org/)
 This organization is the national professional organizational association for speech language pathologists and audiologists; the website is replete with information about career options, planning your education, working in health care and schools, what is involved in preparing for entry into the disciplines, current events, and so forth.
- Kentucky Speech-Language & Hearing Association (http://www.ksha.info/)
 KSHA is considered one of the best state professional organizations in the nation.
 Information about state-level issues, including legislation and clinical practice challenges, can be found here
- Kentucky Board for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology
 (http://www.slp.ky.gov/Pages/default.aspx). This site has information about state laws and regulations, ethics, and other professional issues specific to licensure in Kentucky
- American Academy of Audiology (http://www.audiology.org/)
 The Academy has become a primary source of information and advocacy for audiology.
 Information about practice issues in audiology, education, and advocacy are among the many topics

Additional readings or viewing of free videos may be added based upon current events. No textbook is required for this course.

Attendance:

Attendance and punctuality will be considered part of your grade. Tardiness is defined as arriving after the class is scheduled to begin or departure before the end of the class session. Three tardies constitute one unexcused absence. Each unexcused absence will result in a deduction of 1 point (1%) from your course grade.

Course Assignments:

Course assignments consist of:

- 1) reflection paper on an experience with or investigation of a specific speech, language, or hearing disorder.
- 2) report on a current trend in communication sciences and disorders, and
- 3) report on favorite focus area within the professions of communication sciences and disorders.

Written assignments MUST be in 12 point font, double spaced, and page margins should be 1" for top, bottom, left and right. The 3 written assignments are to be concise. Assignments MUST be a minimum of 1.5 pages and a maximum of 3 pages.

Summary Description of Course Assignments:

- 1) The Reflection Paper should be written about a specific experience you have had with an individual who has/had a speech, language, or hearing disorder or about a type of communication disorder that is of particular interest to you. In your reflection, be sure to provide details about your topic/experience and why you selected it and describe its impact on you and on any interest you may have in the discipline.
- 2) The <u>Report on Current Trends/Topics</u> should be on some discovery or related news event relating to communication sciences and disorders. The content might

involve some new discovery about treatment for fluency disorders, recent advances in the use of cochlear implants, new assessment strategies for predicting recovery after a stroke, controversy about whether severe hearing impairment should be considered a disability, or a variety of other possible topics. You can treat this paper like a reporter finding the "Who, what, why, when, and how" about the current event. Suggested topics and events will be provided on Canvas and will be updated regularly.

3) The Report on Communication Sciences & Disorders as a Career Option is due after we have had sessions on the various options that some professionals have pursued (see schedule for specific due date). This paper should describe your perception of speech-language pathology and audiology as careers and whether or not they are of interest to you. As you describe whether or not the career appeals to you, support your position in a clearly articulated, detailed and thoughtful response.

More information regarding these assignments will be provided. Each written assignment is worth 30% (30 pts) of the course grade.

Submission of Assignments:

All assigned work must be completed and submitted at the beginning of class on the due date to receive full credit. Written assignments will be submitted in Canvas via the Assignment Tab. Label all submissions with your name and course number CSD 120.

Late work:

<u>Late work will not be accepted</u> for a grade unless approved by the instructor. If approved, points will be deducted for late work at the rate of 5 points (5%) of your total course grade per day. Written assignments will be submitted on CANVAS via the Assignment Tab. After one week, late work will not be accepted. Late work associated with an approved excused absence will not be penalized; due dates for submission of late work for an excused absence will be negotiated with the instructor.

Questions Concerning Grades:

All assignments and exams will be evaluated. Any assignment graded incorrectly or questions concerning the grading should be brought to the instructors' attention within one week of the grade being posted/returned.

Excused Absences:

Students need to notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible. Senate Rules 5.2.4.2 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences:

- a) serious illness,
- b) illness or death of family member,
- c) University-related trips,
- d) major religious holidays, and
- e) other circumstances found to fit "reasonable cause for nonattendance" by the professor.

Students anticipating an absence for a major religious holiday are responsible for notifying the instructor in writing of anticipated absences due to their observance of such holidays no later than the last day in the semester to add a class. Two weeks prior to the absence is reasonable, but should not be given any later. Students are expected to withdraw from the class if more than 20% of the classes scheduled for the semester are missed (excused) per University policy.

Make-up opportunity:

Per Senate Rule 5.2.4.2, students missing any graded work due to an excused absence are responsible: for informing the Instructor of Record about their excused absence within one week following the period of the excused absence (except where prior notification is required); and for making up the missed work. The professor must give the student an opportunity to make up the work and/or the exams missed due to an excused absence, and shall do so, if feasible, during the semester in which the absence occurred.

Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work (including, but not limited to a published article, a book, a website, computer code, or a paper from a friend) without clear attribution. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work, which a student submits as his/her own, whoever that other person may be. Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone.

When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources or information, the student

must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where and how he/she has employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content, and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas, which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain.

Please note: Any assignment you turn in may be submitted to an electronic database to check for plagiarism.
