This course will examine the challenges facing the countries of Sub-Saharan Africa in trying to develop their economic, social and political institutions in an era of increasing globalization. We will examine the various issues of key interest in any study of development including agriculture, energy, HIV/AIDS, and the role of international actors like the World Bank, IMF, and NGOs. The course will conclude with focus on the African Union and three countries (Rwanda, Cameroon, and Zimbabwe) that typify the challenges and opportunities facing Africa today. Throughout the course, I will draw upon my experiences living and working in Africa for 12 years, and having served as a U.S. Ambassador to three countries in Africa during my Foreign Service Career.
