## **Course Objectives**

This course will provide an introduction to the principles of microeconomics. We will consider the basic tools of economic theory used to study markets, individual consumer behavior, and the behavior of firms. We will examine how markets work and how supply and demand interact to determine prices. We will also study what happens when markets fail and the role of the government in market activity. The economic tools that we acquire in this course are applied by managers in the business sector, policy makers in the government sector, and economic researchers in the academic arena. Students successfully completing this course should leave with an understanding of these basic economic principles and their applicability to real world situations. You should also be able to incorporate the tools of economic analysis into your own decision-making processes as you weigh costs and benefits to make choices.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

This course is designed for you to learn the fundamental tools and knowledge of microeconomics and to help you learn how to use those tools to understand, explain, and solve real-world events and problems. Specifically, we have the following twelve student learning outcomes for the course:

- 1. Students will be able to describe in depth the five foundations of economics: (1) trade-offs; (2) incentives; (3) marginal thinking; (4) opportunity cost; and (5) how trade creates value.
- 2. Students will be able to explain how specialization and division of labor leads individuals and firms to utilize comparative advantage.

- 3. Students will be able to explain the how the forces of supply and demand lead the market to clear at the equilibrium price.
- 4. Students will be able to use elasticity to explain why some products are desired more intensely than others.
- 5. Students will be able explain the difference between price floors and price ceilings and how the implementation of these price controls lead to unintended consequences throughout economy.
- 6. Students will be able to understand how to measure consumer and producer surplus and why the implementation of taxes often leads to deadweight loss.
- 7. Students will understand how externalities and public goods affect market outcomes and why some market outcomes do not achieve socially optimal results.
- 8. Students will be able to understand the differences between explicit, implicit and sunk costs.
- 9. Students will be able to explain the difference between perfect competition, monopolistic competition, oligopoly and monopoly.
- 10. Students will be able to describe how price discrimination works.
- 11. Students will study how the labor market functions.
- 12. Students will understand how consumer choices are made and learn how to maximize utility.

If I feel that a curve is necessary it will be determined separately for each exam. All other quiz and hw scores are dropped. There are three exams each worth 100 points. Exam questions will reflect the information and ideas presented in the relevant modules and assigned readings.
