<u>Course Description</u>: A survey of British literature from the seventeenth century to the present, with emphasis on different genres, periods, and cultural characteristics of the later English literary tradition. Authors covered include the Augustan poetry of John Dryden and Alexander Pope; the early and later Romantic movements; novelists and poets of the Victorian period such as Charles Dickens, Alfred Tennyson, and Elizabeth B. Browning; the early twentieth-century Modernism of Virginia Woolf and T.S. Eliot; and more.

This class is survey of British Literature from the 17th to the late 20th century, including the study of selected Romantic and Victorian writing, and a selection of 20th century poetry and fiction by various authors. We'll study a variety of genres, principally novels, poems and essays. With an emphasis on close reading, on literary style and on social and historical backgrounds, we'll explore the literature of the period using various approaches.

<u>Prerequisites</u>: None. Lecture. Fulfills ENG major Historical Survey Requirement. Provides ENG minor credit.

<u>Student Learning Outcomes</u>: These are the goals and Student Learning Outcomes for this course:

- 1. The student will read a wide range of literature from the 17th to the 20th centuries, including poetry, fiction and prose.
- 2. The student will be able to discuss and analyze literature orally as well as in writing.
- 3. The student will be able to recognize and describe the chief characteristics of schools and periods of literature, including the Age of Satire (18th C), the Age of Romanticism (1780-1830), The Victorian period (1840-1900), the Age of Modernism and after (20th C).
- 4. The student will be able to identify the chief formal characteristics of poetry (e.g. rhyme, meter, image, diction) and to analyze the relationships between form and content.
- 5. The student will be able to outline the main arguments of prose writings by authors such as Mary Wollstonecroft, Wordsworth, Dickens, Florence Nightingale, et al.
- 6. The student will be able to discuss or analyze the relationship between literature and some major cultural, political or religious themes of the period.
- 7. The student will be able to analyze the main characters of at least two novels and show how the characters relate to each other and how they change or develop through time.
- 8. The student will be able to write coherently about literature and will have an opportunity to revise their work and write at least two drafts of some of their submitted work.

Required texts:

- 1. Norton Anthology of English Literature (ed. Greenblatt, et al), Eighth Edition, Vol. 2 (hereafter referred to as NAEL)
- 2. Thomas Hardy, The Woodlanders (1887)
- 3. Iris Murdoch, A Severed Head (1976)

<u>Required work:</u> all prescribed reading, class participation and discussion, group work, quizzes, three papers (details to be provided), midterm and final examinations (in-class tests)

Grades: Grading scale for undergraduates:

A = 90-100%; B = 80-89%; C = 70-79%; D = 60-69%; E = 59% or lower.

Unsubmitted work will receive a grade of 0.

Grades will be determined with these percentage weights:

• 25% each: Papers 1-3

10% : mid-term10% : final exam

• 5%: participation and quizzes

Course Policies (as per the University of Kentucky, the College of Arts & Sciences, the Dept. of English, and this class):

Attendance policy: Students should attend class and participate in class activities. Absent students must provide documentation concerning the absence no later than one week after the absence occurs. Other than unexpected sickness, only absences that have been discussed with me prior to their occurrence will be considered "excused." A full grade will be deducted from your final grade for five unexcused absences. An excess of six unexcused absences requires withdrawal from the course, according to University policy: missing more than 20% of classes will result in a mandatory W or I (a "Permissive Withdrawl"), as per University Senate Rues 5.1.8.3 and 5.2.4.2. Please notify me if there are emergencies or problems, as per University Senate Rule 5.2.4.2. All University policies regarding disability accommodation will be observed.

Excused Absences:

Students need to notify the instructor of absences prior to class when possible. S.R. 5.2.4.2 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences: (a) serious illness, (b) illness or death of family member, (c) University-related trips, (d) major religious holidays, and (e) other circumstances found to fit "reasonable cause for nonattendance" by the professor.

Students anticipating an absence for a major religious holiday are responsible for notifying the instructor in writing of anticipated absences due to their observance of such holidays no later than the last day in the semester to add a class. Information regarding dates of major religious holidays may be obtained through the religious liaison, Mr. Jake Karnes (859-257-2754).

Verification of Absences:

Students may be asked to verify their absences in order for them to be considered excused. Senate Rule 5.2.4.2 states that faculty have the right to request "appropriate verification" when students claim an excused absence because of illness or death in the family. Appropriate notification of absences due to university-related trips is required prior to the absence.

Academic Integrity:
