As *Faculty Athletics Representative to the NCAA* (2005-2009), Alan helped oversee the academic integrity of all of UK's 22 athletic programs and championed student athlete rights and welfare. Recently, Alan became the first director of the CiConnect *Living and Learning Program*.
