My current position is Gatton Professor of Economics. I received my B.A. in economics from the College of William & Mary in 1973 and my Ph.D. in economics from the University of Virginia in 1979. I was assistant professor at Auburn University from 1978 until 1982, at which point my family and I moved to Lexington. Since 1982 I have been assistant, associate, and full professor of economics at the University of Kentucky.

My teaching interests include microeconomic theory, industrial organization, managerial economics, and law and economics. In my 32 years at UK I have taught 350-student sections of microeconomic principles in Memorial Hall, numerous upper-level undergraduate courses in intermediate microeconomics, industrial organization, and law and economics, managerial economics in our full-time, evening, and Greek MBA programs, and Ph.D. seminars in industrial organization and business strategy.

My research interests include industrial organization, regulation of business, public policy, and applied microeconomics in general. I have published in a variety of academic journals on topics such as franchising, antitrust, tax policy and labor compensation, utility regulation and ratemaking, the economics of lotteries, and the economics of professional sports industries. I have received over \$1.2 million in funding for my research from a variety of federal and state sources, including the National Science Foundation, the Department of Labor, and the National Institute of Health.

I have served as a consultant to several state and federal government agencies and as consultant and expert witness for the U.S. Department of Justice and numerous private-sector businesses.
