Definition: "[**University-]Community Engagement** describes the collaboration between higher education institutions and their larger communities (local, regional/state, national, global) for the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity."

Engagement is NOT a fourth mission for the university. Rather, it is a cross-cutting value set and approach to scholarship that is applicable to research, teaching, and service.

Engagement means not just doing something <u>for</u> someone/entity but doing it <u>with</u> them, recognizing that the community has its own unique/special resources that it can use to benefit the joint effort and the university.

Definition: Community: That which is not the university and not academia. Communities may be **communities of location** (Lexington), **purpose** (dentists, corporations in a given field), **or need** (non-profit organizations needing assistance, people with a common health problem).

Definition: Partnership: Partnership is doing something with some person/entity beyond the university and academia. There are many levels of university-community partnership. Community roles may include (among others) expressing/identifying a problem, issue, or need; allowing university students to have experiences there (internships, clinicals, studios) or faculty to have access to research data; assisting in planning and/or management of the effort; participating in the research, teaching, and/or evaluation; identifying and providing some level of resources to support the effort; and/or sharing responsibility for evaluating the project and disseminating engagement products or practices.

Definition: Benefit: Benefit to the university may mean access to data and/or resources (human, financial, equipment, knowledge, experience, etc.) that may lead to research findings and/or experiences for students that will enhance university teaching and learning. Benefit to the community may mean access to specialized university expertise, equipment, external funding sources, etc.

Areas of university-community engagement:

- Research (including applied research) and creative works that address a community need and that are undertaken in partnership with the community—e.g., Agriculture's reclaiming/ reforesting coal-mined lands, Dentistry's efforts to reduce pre-term/low birthweight babies through removing persistent infections in the mother's mouth
- Technical assistance in solving a community problem (analysis, recommendation, etc.)—e.g., Engineering or Business's assistance to help a corporation build a product better or cheaper, Public Health's efforts to address health problems in Mt. Sterling, Nursing's expertise in assisting interested communities in reducing the incidence of indoor pollution/smoking/radon in their communities, Pharmacy's analysis and recommendations relating to (Kentucky) Medicaid's payment for anti-psychotic drugs
- Teaching for credit, non-credit (CEU), or community understanding that responds to an expressed community need/desire and that is conducted for those communities, not for typical on-campus full-time UK students; e.g., Education's distance learning degree programs to train/certify special education teachers in eastern Kentucky, Library and Information Studies' programs training librarians across Kentucky and surrounding states

- Overseeing Service-Learning or other Community-based Learning Experiences (internships, coops, studios, clinicals, rotations, externships, practica, etc.)
- Serving in the individual's area of UK expertise on community (or community-UK) boards, committees, or commissions—Bob Wiseman's service on the University-Neighborhood Advisory Committee or the Town-Gown Commission, Lisa Higgins-Hord's service on the Town-Gown Committee
- Providing clinical services to meet a community need off-campus—e.g., Research/Medicine's lung cancer vaccination trials, Medicine's Marty Driesler 5th District Cancer Initiative, Dentistry's mobile van and treatments in schools across Kentucky, AHECs

Note that while work each of these areas can constitute community-engaged activity, engaged scholarship would require more. See the draft Promotion and Tenure documents created by the UCAPP Engagement Committee based on Provost Subbaswamy's charge.
