Re: Changes to the Foreign Language and International Economics undergraduate degree program

The Foreign Language and International Economics (FLIE) Coordinating Committee requests your approval for a series of changes to the FLIE undergraduate degree program.

## Summary of proposed changes

- 1. A change in the Economics Core replaces STA 291 with STA 296, which Statistics has developed as a replacement for 291.
- 2. Changes in course requirements for Spanish-FLIE option accomplish two goals:
  - a. include SPA 310 in the core since it is a pre-requisite for both core and elective classes
  - b. give students a wider variety of language courses from which to choose their electives
- 3. Changes in course requirements for the Japanese-FLIE option accomplish two goals:
  - a. expand the range of course offerings for FLIE-Japanese majors
  - b. make the Japanese language requirement compatible with other programs within FLIE
- 4. The addition of an Italian language option to the FLIE program will help students develop their Italian language skills and cultural literacy with a view toward an international career. Italy is the fourth largest economy in the European Union and the ninth largest in the world. Outside of Italy, between 120 and 150 million people use Italian as their second language. Possible careers for FLIE/Italian graduates include international business or law, tourism, foreign and public service, non-profit organizations, fashion and design, and the private sector. U.K. course offerings in Italian have increased in the last four years, and with two full-time faculty members and one part-time instructor, we now have the staffing to cover the required courses. Italian enrollments continue to be strong, and the recent approval of an Italian Studies minor will encourage interest in that language area.

#### **Approvals**

The FLIE program is administered jointly by the Department of Economics, Hispanic Studies, and Modern and Classical Languages. Representatives on the FLIE Coordinating Committee from each department, including faculty from all seven languages currently inovlved in the program, participated in the discussion and approval of these changes. Gloria Allaire has represented the proposed Italian program at all stages of this proposal's development.

Approval for these changes has also been obtained from:

- a. the chairs all departments that share administration of the FLIE program
- b. the faculty of these departments, whose approval is recorded in faculty meeting minutes
- c. the chairs of those departments whose courses are cross-listed in this proposal
