#### **Course Policies:**

#### Attendance Policy

Attendance is required and worth a possible 15 points or 15 percent of the total grade. It is imperative that students attend due to the format of the course, which is comprised of seminars/presentations given by guest speakers. The following are acceptable reasons for an excused absence: 1) serious illness; 2) illness or death of family member; 3) UK related trips (S.R.5.2.4.2 C); 4) major religious holiday and documentation of other reasonable circumstances.
