The Judaic Studies Program at the University of Kentucky is at present limited to 4 language courses in Hebrew, and 3 other general courses on Jewish culture and religion. I should like to expand the Program by making it possible for students to undertake three new courses. Two of the new courses will be HJS 326 *The Jewish Experience in America*, and HJS 327 *Women in Judaism*. I would also like to offer an Independent Study in Judaic Studies HJS 495, since over the years students do occasionally ask to undertake such a project and we do not at present have it available to them.

I attach the details of these three new courses. We should like to offer them as of Fall 2008, and the instructor will I hope be Dr. N. Rosenbaum, who at present teaches all our language courses.

In the scheduling of each course we would of course follow precisely the rules and regulations set out by the University in terms of entering grades, respecting dead week, presenting a detailed syllabus, and so on.

Judaic Studies Program - University of Kentucky HJS 495 Judaic Studies Research Project

3 credits

PURPOSE:

The Judaic Studies Research Project, HJS 495, is designed to provide an opportunity for Judaic Studies minors to develop research projects in collaboration with faculty members and to gain research experience in Judaic Studies.

PREREQUISITES:

• Declared minor in Judaic Studies

ACADEMIC CREDITS:

HJS 495 is taken for 3 credit hours for one semester.

INSTRUCTOR:

The independent research paper or project must be completed under the mentorship of Judaic Studies affiliated faculty member. It is the responsibility of the student to contact a faculty mentor to discuss the faculty expectations regarding the research project. Prior to the last date to add a class, a research contract (see attached) must be completed by the student in collaboration with the faculty mentor and approved by the Director of Judaic Studies.

GRADING POLICIES:

The grade for the course will be based on the grade received in the final paper. Each paper will be evaluated using a 100% HJS range on the basis of the following factors

1. (20 %) Writing (organization of the report, proper grammar, appropriate referencing, spelling errors)

2. (20 %) Demonstrated understanding of the research methodology employed

3. (30 %) Thoroughness and command of the material covered including literature review

4. (20 %) Critical analysis and discussion

5. (10 %) Conclusions

Final Grades: A = 90 and above; B = 80 - 89.9; C = 70 - 79.9; D = 60 - 69.9; E = 59.9 and below.

MAJOR COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- To provide opportunities for Judaic Studies minors to develop research projects in collaboration with faculty members and to gain research experience in Judaic Studies
- To provide the students with experience on research methods related to Judaic Studies
- To demonstrate knowledge acquired from different disciplines through original research, analysis, and discussion.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

By carrying out an independent research paper or project, students are afforded the opportunity to perform in-depth study on a Judaic studies-related topic of their choice. Upon completion of this course, a student should be able to:

- Perform research on a Judaic studies-related topic
- Undertake critical analysis and discussion on a Judaic studies-related topic
- Enhance his/her writing skills

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

- To select a research mentor from the Judaic Studies affiliated faculty before the semester begins and submit a research contract to the Director of Judaic Studies signed by the mentor by the last date to add a class.
- To discuss with the faculty mentor the number of hours of work per week that will be required and the relative importance of research work, required reports, and any subjective factors on the final grade
- To prepare a final report with scholarly references of the research completed in HJS 495 at the end of the semester

FACULTY RESPONSIBILITIES:

- To provide the HJS 495 student with a challenging, but feasible, research project that can be completed, or on which substantial progress can be made, within one semester
- To discuss with the student the number of hours of work per week per credit hour that will be required and the relative importance of research work, required reports, and any subjective factors on the final grade
- To oversee the student's research progress
- To review the student's Final Report at the end of the semester
- To assign the course grade
