 - c. an assignment in English that requires the student to demonstrate information literacy in the discipline.

Describe the topic of your thesis or creative project. How does it relate to your overall educational objectives? (attach additional pages if necessary):

The goal of the creative project is to contribute, with some degree of innovation, to the developing discourse around Amartya Sen and Martha Nussbaum's Capability Theory.

My Topical Studies major, which is categorized as International Law Studies, is a synthesis of legal philosophy, ethics, political science, and gender and women's studies. As a result of being allowed to reflect upon the implications of this particular global development theory, the nuanced and myriad interworking of these four fields will become more evident, and I will be forced to utilize the selective metaphorical muscle groups which I have been exercising over the last three and a half years in a coordinated and unified movement.

Course Activities/Assignments/Submission of Assignments/Tentative Schedule of Completion (attach additional pages if necessary):

Course Activities/Assignments: Having spent a significant portion of my time pouring over the core texts during the preceding semester, spent abroad, and discussing some of the concepts with my advisor, I will begin to sift through works based on gender and women's studies, philosophy, and political science, in order to fortify my contribution, and synthesize the divers aggregation of thought into a cohesive expository singularity. After outlining the pillars which rationalize the structure, I will draw the blueprint, and will then construct the argument. I will produce a research paper of at least 15 pages.

Submission of Assignments: I plan to submit my research paper before finals week at the end of the term.

Tentative Schedule of Completion: My advisor and I will meet at least every other week, and I will submit a topic paragraph by the 10th of February, an outline by the end of February, a rough draft by the end of march, and a final copy by the end of April.

Evaluation of the final text will be based upon the quality of the argument itself, the quality of the texts cited, and the degree of seamlessness by which the respected fields of study are synthesized. 100% of my grade will be based on the quality of the paper I produce.

Attendance Policy: Students are expected to meet with their faculty mentor for guidance, as needed, throughout the semester.

Excused Absences: Students need to notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible. 


