Course Description

A program to investigate design outside of the studio and classroom. Travel experience in combination with on-site lectures and discussions provide opportunity for exploring design considering contextual factors and theories in relation to the locale and precedent. Specific experience to be defined by faculty with a rate of 50 hours of travel-class time for each credit hour earned.

Prerequisites

Permission of faculty program leader or School of Interiors director.

Student Learning Outcomes

Through this travel seminar, students will:

- 1. Explain design in a world context.
- 2. Experience design process tied to place.
- 3. Examine and communicate the essence of place through photographs, writing, and drawings.

Required Materials

Sketchbook, pencils/markers, iPad, camera, or other audio/video recording devices. Texts and background readings as required for specific locale are provided or indicated based on locale.

Description of Course Activities and Assignments

Students participate in the seminar as a member of the class, paying careful

attention to the context and to design at multiple scales, from object to space to building to place. As part of the experience, students learn multiple means of observation and recording through visual and written modes as individual learners and as group learners.

In preparation for travel, students attend orientation meeting(s) before travel departure and a re-entry meeting upon return. Students will be strongly grounded in immersion and thus architectural, cultural, and professional sites will serve as meeting locations. Instructor led observations will be held at many of the field visits to demonstrate methods for utilizing various observational methods and mediums and documenting objective and subjective observations. Students will then utilize this learned information to inform their observations.

The course has three primary components for learning evidence and grade calculation:

Field Journals (25% of grade)

Students will be required to maintain a personal handwritten field journal to individually document their observational exercises, reflections, and sketching. A minimum of five volumetric sketches will be due each day while away. Sketches are to be dated and must include a time stamp (and timed?). Journals will be collected halfway through the program for grading, and are to be additionally submitted for final grading.

Observational Exercises (25% of grade)

Students will complete a series of eight observational and documentation exercises while abroad for each three credits earned. The observations will require you to apply a variety of observational or research techniques in various settings including: cross-cultural comparison, mental mapping, activity analysis, behavioral mapping, still photo survey, time-lapse video, personal inventory, and flow analysis. Observational assignments will be handed out over the course of the program and observational periods conducted, as a class will be followed by discussions to reflect on pre-

observational perceptions and post-observational inferences.

Final Project (25% for card deck, 25% for video)

The final project will be comprise of team and individual deliverables. As final documentation of the observational exercises, students will develop a final research deliverable that summarizes and illustrates the eight observational methods employed and includes a reflection on the importance of this exercise. The final deliverable should demonstrate professionalism in craft and presentation and be submitted as a 'deck of cards'. More specific information will be provided during the pre-departure meetings.

Students should consider media printing sites such as www.moo.com and www.lulu.com to achieve high quality prints. Additionally, working in teams of 2-3 students, you are to develop a short video (no more than 5 minutes for each three credits), which documents your creative interpretations of the overall study abroad experience, cultural investigations, and observational exercises. Videos should be uploaded and shared through www.vimeo.com/with the instructor and classmates.
Team members will receive identical grades for the group project.

Students submit field journals and participate in observational exercises during the

travel experience. Final projects due as delineated on course calendar. No late work is permitted.

Attendance

It is expected that students will participate in all aspects of the travel experience as articulated on the course itinerary.

Professional Behavior

Each student is expected to practice professional behavior throughout the internship, including timely arrival, neat appearance, and an attitude/spirit of success. Students must follow the policies established by the university during travel, as outlined below and as referenced in administrative regulations.

Academic Integrity
