The rationale for this proposed change for the Interior Design curriculum is:
(1). To reposition the University of Kentucky's Interior Design program as the most sought after professional program in the state (there is one other);
(2). To address changes that have occurred with the implementation of the 2009 Council of Interior Design Accreditation (CIDA) Professional Standards;
(3). To competitively position the program with regards to other professional programs nationally; and

(4). To address the university's the new General Education requirements.

(1.). In the fall of 2005 the School of Interior Design moved from a four-year undergraduate degree to a five-year undergraduate degree with selective admissions at both the entry point and after the first year of course work. Economic issues from both the perspective of the student and the program were major contributors to this decision. For twenty-five plus years, the program had between 75 to125 students entering at the freshman year. By the end of the second year when the students had to go through a portfolio review prior to admittance into the upper level, the numbers typically had leveled to approximately 30 students. Due to the five-hour studio requirement every semester, students changing their major would have an excessive number of hours, which would not transfer to another program. Likewise, the school invested large quantities of faculty and other resources in teaching at the first and second year. At the time of its development a five -year program with a two-tiered selective admission process seemed like a good option, as it would allow the program to limit enrollment to manageable numbers, require a semester-long off campus experience, and provide an opportunity for students to develop a depth of knowledge in a complimentary area, a strength highly valued in the profession. However, the consequence of adding a fifth year to the program in combination with the global economic downturn has resulted in a critical shortage of applicants to the program. Given the evidence of the stability of enrollment at other accredited programs across the nation and the reported growth in the numbers enrolling in the other accredited program within the state, it has been determined that the program should return to a four-year degree of 132 hours, which concurs with the hours required in the former four-year curriculum. The Selective Admission Policies at the first year will be maintained. However, the Portfolio Review requirement prior to entry into the second year is not deemed necessary in the revised plan.

(2). The proposed program has taken into consideration the revised CIDA Professional Accreditation Standards, which were implemented in January 2009 just after our last accreditation visit which occurred in the fall of 2008. Implementation of these proposed curriculum changes now will facilitate the program in preparation for our next visit and allow the unit to have the required body of student work demonstrating achievement levels required. (3). In addition, the proposed program will allow the school to define its graduates uniquely from all other accredited program graduates in the country. The school was challenged by the dean to define its uniqueness that would allow the school to become nationally known for more than just excellence. The proposed curriculum allows for the program to cultivate graduates with a design and workplace focus that draws on the expertise of the faculty and opportunities at the university. Specifically, defining one area of focused concentration has allowed the proposed curriculum to combine & streamline the former professional support & focused elective requirements of the five-year curriculum. This has been done in consultation with our Advisory Board and CIDA Standards.

(4). Finally, a major revision could not be taken without consideration of the new General Education requirements, and the proposed curriculum has addressed those requirements in lieu of the University Studies requirements.

School of Interior Design Undergraduate Admission Procedures

Admission into the Major

Students who want to major in Interior Design must first be admitted into the School of Interior Design

Premajor Admission

Students who want to major in Interior Design must first be admitted into the premajor (first year of the five year program).

Freshman Candidates

1. File a University application with the Office of Undergraduate Admission and the University Registrar by **February 1** for fall admission in the year which the student wants to begin the program. For fall admission, applicants must register for and take the American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) on or before the December test date.

 Apply for premajor admission to the School of Interior Design. The *Premajor Major Admission Application Form* and requirements are available on the college Web site at: www.uky.edu/Design/interiordesignadmissions.html.

3. Write Submit an essay as required by the *Premajor Major Admission Application Form*. The essay will require applicants to express in both written and visual format the rationale for their interest in the Interior Design profession and what steps they have taken to make an informed decision regarding their choice for a major.

4. The *Premajor Major Admission Application Form* and requirements with essay must be received on or before **February March 1** in the year the student wants to begin the program. Submit Application should be sent to:

Transfer Students without Interior Design Credit

Transfer candidates from educational programs other than interior design will be required to observe the same application process and deadlines as outlined for premajors freshmen. Please note that the deadline is earlier than that for general admission of transfer students to the University.

Premajor Major Admission Selection Process

Candidates will be admitted to the premajor major in order of priority based on demonstrated potential for academic achievement in the first year of the program by at the freshman level as indicated by high school grade-point average, ACT/SAT scores, and the required essay. Additional consideration will be given to the student's demonstrated participation in extracurricular, service, or work activities that show evidence for potential development of characteristics that will assist them in succeeding in the profession. Acceptance will be on a comparative and competitive basis and limited to the number of students the School of Interior Design is able to accommodate in studio. Notification of acceptance in the premajor major will permit registration into the freshman studio, ID 121, ID 171 fall semester of the same year. Admission will not be deferred.

Admission Into the Major

Premajor Students

Admission into the Interior Design major occurs after completing the first and second semester requirements and is dependent upon the qualifications and preparation of the applicant as demonstrated by their portfolio. Since the number of students admitted to the major will be limited beginning with the sophomore level course work, applicants will be selected on a comparative and competitive basis. To be considered for admission into the interior design major, an applicant must fulfill the following requirements:

1. Make application by **April 1** for admission into the Interior Design major for the fall semester of the next academic year. The *Major Admission Application Form* for the School of Interior Design is available on the college Web site at: www.uky.edu/Design/interiordesignadmissions.html. Submit application to:

2. Completed or currently enrolled in all required premajor Interior Design course work, including ARC 111, ID 142, ID 171 and ID 172.

3. Submit for blind review a portfolio of work completed in the freshman level Interior Design studio courses. Requirements and the submission date for the Portfolio Review for a specific year will be available on the College of Design Web site by **December 1** for the following spring review.

Transfer Students with Design Credit

Students who have university credit in design course work from an accredited professional program (CIDA, NAAB, etc.) who want to transfer into the School of Interior Design must make application for admission to the major. The application process includes:

1. File a University application with the Office of Undergraduate Admission and the University Registrar to be received by **March 1** for fall admission. Request an official transcript of college course work to be received by University of Kentucky Admissions by **April 1**. **Please note that this deadline is earlier than those for application to the University in general.**

2. Apply for admission into the School of Interior Design. The *Major Admission Application Form* for the school is available on line on the college Web site at: www.uky.edu/Design/interiordesignadmissions.html.

3. 2. Submit a portfolio of student work completed in the university from which they are transferring. previous design program. If the applicant wants the portfolio returned, the portfolio should be submitted with return packaging and mailing labels provided. The School of Interior Design will return the portfolio by C.O.D.

4. Request three letters of reference addressed to the Major Admissions Committee. At least one reference must be submitted from a previous design professor. Other references are the candidate's choice. These letters of reference must be sealed and signed by the author across the seal.

5. 3. The *Major Transfer Admission Application Form*, portfolio, and transcript three letters of reference should be in one package, received by submitted no later than May 1 for fall term admission in the same year, and delivered to:

Major Transfer Admission Selection Process

Admission into the Interior Design major will be dependent upon the applicant's qualifications and preparation. The indication of general overall academic success Criteria for admission will include the student's demonstration of success in the following areas: overall (GPA), success in the Major requirements, and probability of success in a professional program as predicted by a review of the work submitted in the portfolio of student required work will be evaluated. ; and potential for professional aptitude. Since the number of students admitted will be limited, applicants will be examined on a comparative and competitive basis. Candidates will be admitted in order of priority. Preference will be given to students completing the premajor requirements at the University of Kentucky. Admission for a specific semester will not be deferred.
