Re: Credit-Only Change to "Experimental" Law Courses

The faculty voted to approve a credit-only change to the courses in the Law Catalog that act as a holding place for our provisional ("experimental") courses, Law 900-909, on April 28th, 2016. The reason this vote was necessary is that during the May 14, 2015 faculty meeting, the faculty approved a new course called Foreign and International Legal Research that was proposed and approved as a 1 credit course. The snag was that the UK Registrar's system will not accommodate anything other than a 2-3 credit experimental course, because Law 900-909 were approved years ago to accommodate 2-3 credit courses.

To be clear, the only change we request is for the Law 900-909 grouping to have an expanded number of credits that are possible for an experimental course at the College of Law. In other words, I request that the number of credits be expanded to a range of 1-4, given that both 1 and 4 credit courses will likely be proposed in the near future (and given that existing law courses range from 1-4 credits). This means that Law 900, 901, 902, 903, 904, 905, 906, 907, 908, and 909 will be variable from 1-4 credits, rather than the current 2-3 credits. Nothing substantive about the courses that are currently enumerated in Law 900-909 will change.

Finally, because we now have a fall advanced research course and a spring advanced research course approved for registration at 1 credit hour, I request that this change be implemented as quickly as possible for Law 900, 901, 902, 903, 904, 905, 906, 907, 908, and 909.
