SYLLABUS: ANIMAL RIGHTS

LAW 904 - 001

COURSE COVERAGE: This course provides an introductory exploration of the

creation, development and application of the rights of animals in the context of the substantive criminal law.

CLASS MEETINGS: This class meets Wednesdays in Room 215 from 4:00 PM until 5:50 PM.

ATTENDANCE POLICY: **READ THIS VERY CAREFULLY**. Attendance is mandatory and roll is taken at each class meeting. If you have seven (7) or more absences [excused or unexcused], then you cannot take the final examination for this class and will not receive credit for this course.
