i. Course Description for Bulletin:	This course will explore the implications of recent social science research on human behavior for law and legal decision-making. In the past few decades, new discoveries in psychology, cognitive science, neuroscience, and economics have challenged fundamental ideas about how people think and decide. We will consider their application to a variety of areas of the law including criminal and civil law and jury decision-making. Topics will include happiness and hedonic psychology, the role of emotion and reason in decision-making, creativity, risk assessment, and free will. These topics will be discussed in comparative perspective -- e.g., recent efforts by the governments of France and Bhutan to encourage Gross Domestic Happiness. Students will write a series of short (2-3 page) analysis papers.


