The Latin American, Caribbean, and Latino Studies Program is proposing to make two changes to its minor in order to facilitate for students, the process of completion of the minor. Presently, the minor is structured in such a way that students need to take as a required course, either HIS 206 or 207. However, there have been semesters in which neither course is offered. Then, students need to select 12 credit hours from four areas in which only certain courses can be taken in order to fulfill the requirement for that area. Again, there have been semesters in which courses from one particular are not offered.
The proposed model opens the possibilities for students to select the courses from the ones that are offered every semester.

1. The first change we propose is to get rid of the HIST 206 or 207 requisite, and instead include both courses as electives to fulfill the minor requirements.
2. The second change we propose is that instead of structuring the minor in four sections, which is limiting for our students, we will list the courses that are usually offered and students can select form that pool. Still, students will need to choose their courses from at least three different disciplines. Students will be able to take the courses that are offered in a given semester, which are usually twelve (with $100 \%$ Latin American, Caribbean, and Latino content) instead of having to wait until a required course is offered.
We will still have a language requirement, (Spanish, or any other language spoken in Latin America and the Caribbean listed on the form above the 200 level) and the completion of LAS 202 (Introduction to Latin American Studies).
The proposed new model aligns with other similar minors offered through the College of Arts \& Sciences, and will ensure students a timely completion.
