### Nonprofit Organizations Spring 2007 Prof. Michael

#### **Syllabus and Course Information**

**Description.** This course will introduce you to the laws and policies governing the formation, operation, and dissolution or conversion of nonprofit organizations, including charities, foundations, associations, and clubs. These entities form a growing and increasingly important part of our economy. The concepts involved in this course will be helpful for your general law practice or as a starting point for further advanced study of nonprofit organizations in the healthcare, trust, or bankruptcy areas (to name a few). The general substantive coverage of the course is approximately one-half "organizational" law – the state law governing the formation and operation of the entity – and approximately one-half federal income tax law. The tax law is not (for the most part) computational and technical, but concerns limitations on the operations of the entity in order to obtain and retain exemption from federal income tax. I plan to cover Chapters 1 through 7 and part of Chapter 10 of the casebook, so a review of those parts of the table of contents will give you a good idea of where we are going this semester.

Prerequisites. Law 851 (Business Associations) and Law 860 (Tax I).

**Materials.** Fishman & Schwarz, *Nonprofit Organizations* (3rd ed. 2006) with statutory supplement. Other materials may be distributed as necessary. There is a TWEN site for this course for which you should register right away to be sure you stay informed.

**Evaluation.** Your grade will be based on a midterm examination (30%), class participation (10%) and a final examination (60%). The midterm will be a "take-home" exam distributed after class on Monday, March 5 and due by 3 p.m. on Friday, March 9. Class will not meet during the midterm-writing time period. The final will be given on Monday, April 30 at 1:30 pm. There will be exceptions only in case of emergency.

Attendance and participation. This class is substantially problem-based. It is imperative to your understanding and success in this class that you have read the materials and made your best effort at understanding the assigned problems. I will assume that you are available to participate unless you notify me otherwise before class. Class participation will be scored each time on a scale of 0 (unprepared or no answer) to 10 (superior with exceptional insight). I would expect an average score to be around 7. I will average all of your scores together for your class participation grade at the end of the semester. I follow only the College of Law attendance rules: you are permitted eleven absences (whether excused or not). I will assume that you know when you are not here and that you can count to eleven, and therefore I will not assume responsibility for warning you if your attendance is becoming a problem. I will not modify your grade based solely on your attendance, but note that a material part of your grade is based upon participation, and it is hard for you to participate if you're not here.

Goals and aspirations. As you may be aware, this is a new offering for the College of Law. It is one which I have believed for many years should be a core part of a well-rounded curriculum. Since it is new, I may need to make some changes as we go along. I will try to be flexible, and I ask the same of you. I welcome your positive or negative feedback at *any* time. I hope that you and I will both find this an interesting and productive semester together.
