1.How does this course provide for timely and appropriate interaction between students and faculty and among students? Does the course syllabus conform to University Senate Syllabus Guidelines, specifically the Distance Learning Considerations? As a hybrid course, the class would meet each week just like any other class. The students will have done the readings and watched the instructional videos (several videos each week of about 12 minutes each). Class would then be devoted to discussing the online materials. So the expectation is that this course would actually feature a little more interaction time than most courses.

- 2.How do you ensure that the experience for a DL student is comparable to that of a classroom-based student's experience? Aspects to explore: textbooks, course goals, assessment of student learning outcomes, etc. This application is for the addition of a distance learning component to an existing PhD course. The textbook used in the past will continue to be used. The course goals remain the same: on completion of the course, the student should have a clear understanding of the main theoretical approaches in social network analysis, and be capable of designing and carrying out a social network research project. Assessment will also not change: it consists of a term paper of publishable quality (again, this is a PhD level course).



COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a PhD level course on social network analysis. The focus is both theoretical (e.g., what are the key concept i analysis) and methodological (e.g., how do we actually carry out research on social networks). What the course is a social network research to date (we have a separate course for that taught by Prof. Dan Brass). The course begins of a social network and a review of key concepts from the underlying mathematical field of graph theory. We then I dyadic concepts in network analysis, such as the notion of graph-theoretic distance. Next we cover node-level conc centrality and ego-network structure. Next we cover whole-network level concepts, such as network density. The e is devoted to issues of research design and methodology, including data collection and analysis techniques.

GOALS AND OUTCOMES

This is a hands-on course with the objective of teaching a student how to do a network analysis. At the end of this should be able design and implement a social network analysis research project, including analyzing the data and v results for a journal. The key deliverable for the course is a publishable research paper.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

The textbook for this course is Wasserman and Faust, 1994 Social Network Analysis. Cambridge. This is an indispensable reference book, but difficult to read from front to back. Suggested readings from the book will be assigned, but there will be no required readings from it. All of the required readings are articles, chapters and handouts, which are given in the schedule. Links to all the readings can be found on the class website at https://sites.google.com/site/mgt780sna.

A new book I highly recommend is the Sage Handbook of Social Network Analysis edited by Scott and Carrington.

In addition, we will be using the UCINET software. You should download and install UCINET as soon as possible in C any problems. A free registration code will be made available to you in class (but the program will run for 60 days to code).

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

Grading for this course is based on just two things: (1) a research paper (worth 75% of your grade), and (2) class (worth 25%). There are no exams in this course.



Research Paper (75%). For the paper, you must design and implement an empirical study of social networks. While required to submit this paper to a journal for publication, it should be of publishable quality and written up in Acade Management Journal format. Copies of past (successful) papers are available on the class website. The paper is due exactly one week after the last class (see the <u>schedule</u> for the exact date).
