MUC 190 Rationale

UK's athletic pep bands are made up of personnel from the Wildcat Marching Band (MUC 190-001). In order for students to receive credit for being in a pep band, they need to be registered for its designated section of MUC 190. Since the pep bands are a subset of MUC 190-001 Marching Band, students who are participating in Wildcat Marching Band during fall semesters also need to be registered for the section of MUC 190 that denotes the athletic pep bands. Therefore, the MUC 190 course needs to be repeatable during the same semester as long as it is identified by a different section number.

Course / Attendance Policies:

- 2. Call time for performances are 2 hours before tip off for Men's Basketball Band (at Fine Arts) & 45 minutes before Women's Basketball Band (at Memorial). If you are driving to Rupp arena for a game, please be there by 90 minutes before tip.
- 3. Dress for basketball band is as follows: Black pants, WMB Nike polos (tucked in), black belt, and black shoes. If you would like to wear a hat, please wear the WMB Nike hat.
- 4. The pay for the basketball band this year will be \$20 per Women's Home Game, you will find a schedule of performances listed below. If there are any questions, please feel free to contact Mr. Atchison (scott.lee.atchison@uky.edu) or Michael Black (mcblack85@gmail.com).
- 5. If you need to miss a performance it is your responsibility to provide a qualified sub, fill out the sub form and submit it to the Band Office at least 24 hours prior to the date of the absence; the only exception is for unforeseen emergencies, which must subsequently be verified per the excused absence policy. Excused Absences:

Students need to notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible.
