Prerequisites

Students must be currently enrolled in applied lessons in the area in which they will perform their senior recital. BM students must be taking lessons for 3-hours credit and BMME and BA students for 2 hours credit.

Students must also find a time and place for their recital and fill out the necessary forms. A final version of their recital programs is required. Because of the high demand for recital times at UK, we encourage students to confirm their recital dates early in the semester of the recital.

All student recitals require a \$100 recital fee that is automatically added to the student billing in the semester of the recital. This fee entitles the students to a recording of the recital, as well as a program and use of the appropriate campus facilities. A student recital packet can be obtained in the Music Office. All recital forms are found at http://www.uky.edu/FineArts/Music/current/#forms and should be completed at least 30 days prior to the recital date.

Attendance and Preparation

Students must have permission of their instructors to sign up for a recital after demonstrating competency in their applied lessons during their senior year. This includes diligent preparation and progress made in their applied lessons. Students must also pass a recital hearing in order to perform their recital.

Students may be asked to verify their absences in order for them to be considered excused. Senate Rule 5.2.4.2 states that faculty have the right to request "appropriate verification" when students claim an excused absence because of illness or death in the family.

Student learning outcomes

The goal of the recital is for students to have a capstone senior experience and demonstrate senior-level mastery of performance in their area. Students who are enrolled in the BMME and BM programs are required to perform this recital as part of their degree.

- 1. Students will demonstrate mastery, ease, and technical abilities in preparation and performance of the recital.
- 2. Students will demonstrate a senior-level overall performance impression, which includes accuracy in pitch, rhythm, and dynamics, stylistically-informed understanding of

the music, and general musicianship.

3. Students will learn the criteria for putting together a cohesive and thoughtful recital program and the discipline required to learn an entire program at one time.

Recital

The faculty member in charge of their applied lessons needs to approve all recital repertoire. B.M. Performance majors must present a full senior recital that consists of a minimum of 50 minutes and consists largely of solo compositions. BMME students must present a senior recital that consists of a minimum of 25 minutes of music and consists largely of solo compositions.

Students who play a degree recital during the semester are exempt from taking juries during the semester of the recital.

Grade of "Pass"

To receive a passing grade a student must demonstrate very good to excellent preparation in performance ability and knowledge of the recital music. The performance includes general musicianship, stylistically appropriate ornamentation and expressions, accuracy of notes, dynamics, and rhythms, as well as clean intonation, steady tempo, and overall structural understanding of the individual compositions. When memorization is required, there must be minimal memory slips that do not dramatically take away from the overall quality of the performance.

Grade of "Fail"

To fail the recital, students will display problems with note and rhythm accuracies, intonation, and be unable to indicate appropriate stylistic concepts, steady tempi, and overall musicianship. When memorization is required, students who have several serious and problematic slips that greatly diminish the overall performance of the program will also fail in conjunction with other indications of lack of preparation. In short, a student fails when he or she does not display very good to excellent performance of the attempted program.

Textbook

No Textbook is required, but students will be expected to purchase the music they perform from for their recitals.
