#### **Course Description:**

This course is especially designed for music teachers who wish to acquire knowledge and skills in Dalcroze pedagogy and musicianship. There are two parts of this course: on-site participation and a Blackboard component. Students will be immersed in the principal subjects of the Dalcroze approach: eurhythmics, solfège, and improvisation. The on-site session provides creative experiences of hands-on activities and the Blackboard component covers assignments related to the philosophy, history, composition, lesson designs, and discussion of the Dalcroze approach in music education. Pre-requisite: Successful completion of MUS 663 or equivalent and permission by instructor

This is a three-credit (credit hours) course, which may be taken to fulfill degree requirements for graduate students in music education.

# **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- 1. Eurhythmics: Students will demonstrate mastery of advanced eurhythmics concepts, emphasizing meter transformation, metric modulation, hemiola, and syncopation.
- 2. Solfege: Students will show facility in singing and identifying "Do-to-do" chromatic scales in the fixed-do system; singing and notating all major, minor scales, and modes; and with sensitivity to intonation, expressive singing, and composition based on solfege principles.
- 3. Improvisation: Students will improvise music for movement at the piano or using other instruments, for eurhythmics subject currently studied; design and execute improvisation plans for solo and duet playing; and improvise on the spot with musical coherence.
- 4. Students will design instructional materials and lesson activities implementing the Dalcroze philosophy, pedagogic techniques, and skills for their own students applying the knowledge covered in this course.

### DALCROZE MATERIALS AND PEDAGOGY III

**OVERVIEW:** Through observation, demonstration, readings, discussion, lesson planning, peer teaching, and critical evaluation, students will continue learning the principles of the Dalcroze philosophy and how those principles can be applied to various groups of children and adults.

# REQUIRED TEXTS:

#### ASSIGNMENTS

Reading: Dalcroze Eurhythmics in Today's Music Classroom: Chapter 1, 2, 3, 4

**Observation:** Two annotated observations of Dalcroze lessons (10%)

Include discussions of use of piano and other instruments, teacher improvisation, student responsiveness, sequencing of activities, use of folk songs and other musical repertoire, teacher modeling, use of props (such as balls or scarves), and any other relevant topics.

**Teaching:** One 30-45 minute lesson (30%)

A presentation illustrating the ability to apply Dalcroze core subjects to teaching children

- Developing lesson plans and activities based on model lessons
- Examining, articulating, and demonstrating the Dalcroze process and scaffolding
- Playing for movement (skipping, walking, marching, running, and other locomotor movements)

Teaching also includes a need for a certain level of master in piano improvisation, which includes the following:

- Improvising based on a determined measure shape
- Improvising using complementary rhythmic material, especially when improvising with partners
- Creating melodies based on tri-chords and thirds
- Improvising in 9/8 and 12/8
- Improvising over simple harmonic progressions
- Improvising melodies using an expanded harmonic palette
- Improvising pieces that convert back and forth from 3/4 to 6/8.
- Improvising with triplets, unequal beats, and unequal measures
- \*Discussion: Entries on the Discussion Board (10%)
- \*Lesson Plans: Three sequential lesson plans (20%)

Include clear instructions regarding use of piano and other instruments, teacher improvisation, sequencing of activities, use of folk songs and other musical repertoire, teacher modeling, use of props (such as balls or scarves), and any other relevant topics.

\*Written Papers: Three Dalcroze subject papers - short papers (2-4 pages each) discussing a Dalcroze subject, with sample activities, supporting musical examples, ideas for improvised music, and reasons for teaching. (30%)

**ASSESSMENT:** \*Written work will be evaluated with regard to thoroughness and clarity, and how well it demonstrates an understanding of the Dalcroze philosophy. Written work is submitted via Blackboard or by email. Teaching will be evaluated with regard to effectiveness and how well Dalcroze principles are incorporated.
