MUS 760: Research III (3 credits)

#### Rationale

Research Methodology has expanded to cover many new strategies of collecting data in recent years. This is due to greater capabilities of computers for measurement and statistical analysis on the one hand, and the availability of electronic resources for researchers. Furthermore the current field of music therapy demands research-based evidence to guide practice. It is crucial that students pursuing a career in music therapy to be knowledgeable of research methods and feel confidence in executing research studies and writing reports. This course will allow students to learn the latest research tools and methods, and complete hands-on research projects under the supervision of a faculty researcher. It is required in similar doctoral programs such as at Florida State University.
