Rationale for Proposal

The rationale for the minor has two components, one addressing practical issues, the other looking at the core reasons for the study of folklore and myth.

On the practical level:

- the extant fairy tale, folklore, and myth courses have the highest enrollment of all courses in MCL so that student interest seems assured;
- the minor will utilize more fully extant faculty expertise; and
- the creation of MCL allowed for a relatively seamless co-ordination of course offerings into an interdisciplinary minor.

Folklore and mythology can serve to:

- increase students' ability to understand ancient and medieval, as well as contemporary societies from within;
- help students gain insights into the culturally diverse ways people think and act;
- give voice to those peoples and groups of peoples traditionally silenced by "high" culture;
- symbolize, critique, and / or subvert the prevailing dominant cultures; and
- articulate how the past shapes present attitudes, beliefs, and concerns.
