University Senate November 12, 2012

The University met in regular session at 3 pm on Monday, November 12, 2012 in the Auditorium of W. T. Young Library. Below is a record of what transpired. All votes were taken via a show of hands unless indicated otherwise.

Senate Council Chair Lee X. Blonder called the University Senate (Senate) meeting to order at 3:03 pm. The Chair reminded senators to:

- Sign in upon arrival;
- Give name and affiliation when speaking;
- Communicate with constituency;
- Attend meetings;
- Respond to emails and web postings as appropriate;
- Acknowledge and respect others; and
- Silence all electronic devices.

The Chair explained that she would entertain a motion to waive *Senate Rule 1.2.3* to allow the Senate to consider the agenda, etc. because agenda was not sent out six days in advance, due to the Election Day holiday. D. Anderson **moved** that the Senate waive *SR 1.2.3* to allow consideration of the agenda, etc. for November 12, 2012. Debski **seconded**. There being no discussion, a **vote** was taken and the motion **passed** with none opposed.

1. Minutes from October 8 and October 22, 2012 and Announcements

The Chair reported that no changes were received for the minutes from October 8, 2012. There were **no objections** so the minutes from October 8, 2012 **were approved as distributed** by **unanimous consent**.

The Chair then reported that no changes were received for the minutes from the special meeting on October 22, 2012. There were **no objections** so the minutes from special meeting on October 8, 2012 **were approved as distributed** by **unanimous consent**.

The Chair offered a few announcements.

- The Student Government Association (SGA), Office of the Senate Council (OSC) and Information
 Technology are working together on the creation of a syllabus repository. It will likely be
 patterned after the repository used by the College of Education. The OSC is working to ensure
 the site is faculty- and student-friendly.
- Those three groups are also working on a syllabus generator as an option for faculty. Any faculty member is welcome to participate in focus groups regarding the syllabus generator and the syllabus repository. Participation should not take more than three to four hours total, throughout the semester. Interested faculty can contact Sheila Brothers if interested.
- Updated version of the *University Senate Rules* will be posted later this week look for an email announcement.

- The OSC is soliciting input on a possible redesign for some or all aspects of the Senate's web site.
 Considerations include ensuring the site is faculty-friendly and what will facilitate easy
 information gathering. For example, one SC member suggested having a section dedicated to
 facilitating communication between senators and colleges. Senators were asked to contact
 Sheila Brothers with suggestions.
- The Health Care Colleges Council will be chaired by the College of Dentistry's Assistant Dean for Admissions and Student Affairs Cindy Beeman. The term for that position is through spring 2015.
 The next chair will be from Health Sciences.
- The annual Stakes reception will take place on December 11, on the 18th floor of Patterson Office Tower, in mid-afternoon. Additional details will follow via email. The Stakes event is an opportunity to mingle informally with faculty and staff senators as well as with members of the Board of Trustees.
- Elected faculty senators were reminded that the process of electing three new members to the SC will begin soon; an email will be sent out about this later in November.

2. Officer and Other Reports

a. Chair (5 minutes)

The Chair said that President Capilouto and Interim Provost Tim Tracy offered the opportunity to add three additional faculty to the Provost's Council on Metrics. As determined by the SC, those three are Nancy Johnson (BE), John Strang (AG, Extension) and Melynda Price (Law). There was an additional opportunity to add three more faculty to the Financial Model Steering Committee. Again, as determined by the SC, those three are David Pienkowski (EN), Jeff Suchanek (LI) and Connie Wood (AS).

b. Vice Chair (5 minutes)

Vice Chair Grossman said that he had nothing to report.

c. Trustee (5 minutes)

Faculty trustee John Wilson said there was no meeting of the Board of Trustees (Board) in November; the next meeting will be December 11. Immediately following the Board meeting in December is an opportunity for informal chats between faculty and staff and trustees. Wilson thanked the University community for effectively communicating the depth and breadth of faculty concerns on the budget cuts. He urged senators to continue informing senior administrators of faculty concerns as the budget process continues.

3. Committee Reports

a. Senate's Academic Programs Committee (SAPC) - Andrew Hippisley, Chair

i. Proposed New Bachelor of Arts in Environmental and Sustainability Studies

Hippisley said that the motion from the SAPC was that the Senate approve, for submission to the Board of Trustees, the establishment of a new Bachelor of Arts in Environmental and Sustainability Studies, within the College of Arts and Sciences. Because the **motion** came from committee, no **second** was required. Hippisley described the proposal to senators. There were a few questions from senators. A **vote** was taken and the motion **passed** with none opposed.

The Chair suggested that the Senate move to agenda item number four, and return to the next agenda item when Farrell arrived. There were no objections.

5. Proposed Changes to Governing Regulations II (Athletics Committee)

The Chair explained that the proposed changes will increase the threshold amount for Athletics-related capital projects from \$400,000 to \$600,000. The change will make the threshold consistent with other *Governing Regulations* and Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS). The **motion** from the SC was that the Senate make a positive recommendation for endorsement of the proposed changes to *Governing Regulations VIII* ("University Appointments"). Because the motion came from committee, no **second** was required. There was very brief discussion. A **vote** was taken and the motion **passed** with none opposed and one abstaining.

4. Proposed Changes to Governing Regulations VIII ("University Appointments")

The Chair explained that there were two revisions to *Governing Regulation VII* (*GR VIII*). The first permits the President to delegate to the Provost to take final action on a wide range of personnel matters. The President's input is reserved for adjudication in instances of appeals. The President can sustain or reverse the Provost's decision. This will also make *GR VI* consistent with *Administrative Regulation 2:1*, which was discussed and endorsed by the Senate in 2011. That *Administrative Regulation* discussion triggered the need to update *GR VIII*. The second part of the revision modifies the language on initial faculty appointment for salaries that have to be reported to the Board of Trustees (Board). The current threshold has a dollar figure and the proposed threshold will be determined by a formula. The Chair said that the **motion** from the SC was to recommend the Senate make a positive recommendation for endorsement of the proposed changes to *Governing Regulations VIII* ("University Appointments"). Because the **motion** came from committee, no **second** was required.

The Chair solicited comments from senators. After a question about the formula, Richard Greissman, the Provost's liaison to the SC, explained that the idea was to avoid putting a specific dollar threshold into the *Governing Regulations*, since there is so much heterogeneity across the University. There was additional discussion. Regarding the threshold, it was clarified that the Senate was being asked to recommend a change from a threshold based on fixed value to a threshold based on a to-bedetermined-in-the-future formula.

When there was no further discussion, a **vote** was taken and the **motion** passed with none opposed.

6. Proposed Changes to *Governing Regulations II* (Committee Structure)

The Chair stated that this particular agenda item was pulled from the Senate agenda because additional revisions were possible. It will be on a Senate agenda the near future.

7. <u>Informational Presentation on April 2014 National Conference on Undergraduate Research and</u> Motions (5 - 10 minutes)

Guest Diane Snow, director of undergraduate research, offered a presentation to senators on the April 2014 Conference on Undergraduate Research that will take place on campus. Snow answered questions from senators.

The Chair explained that there were a couple of recommendations from SC. The first **motion** from the SC recommended the Senate endorse the request from UK's National Conference on Undergraduate Research (NCUR) programming committee to ask faculty to redirect undergraduate classes on April 3 -5, 2014 and encourage students to participate in NCUR. Because the **motion** came from committee, no **second** was required. There was additional discussion. A **vote** was taken and the motion **passed** with one opposed.

Turning to the second recommendation, the Chair said the second **motion** from the SC recommended the Senate authorize the Registrar to make scheduling arrangements as necessary for NCUR to proceed and if someone's room is used for NCUR, the Registrar will identify another room for the class if possible. Because the **motion** came from committee, no **second** was required. During discussion, senators learned that the motion, if passed, will affect any level course, not just undergraduate courses.

D. Anderson **moved to amend the motion** to remove the phrase "if possible" from the end of the sentence. Butler **seconded**. After additional discussion, A **vote** was taken on the amendment and the motion **passed** with 38 in favor and 16 opposed.

There being no additional discussion, a **vote** was taken on the **motion** that the Senate authorize the Registrar to make scheduling arrangements as necessary for NCUR to proceed and if someone's room is used for NCUR, the Registrar will identify another room for the class. The motion **passed** with two opposed and four abstaining.

8. Interim Provost Tim Tracy

Interim Provost Tim Tracy offered a presentation on the budget and the values-based budget model. He answered questions during his presentation – below are highlights.

- The Libraries are considered academic overhead.
- The decision to move salaries of former administrators to their home academic unit (as opposed to having the salaries funded from the Provost's office) was made by Interim Provost Tracy's predecessor in the Provost's office.
- Units that charge for their services and administrative activities will be encouraged to be efficient through feedback mechanisms that are not yet developed.
- There will be metrics that specifically value and encourage diversity and inclusivity.
- The values-based budget model should not be implemented at departmental levels until colleges have a good understanding of how the model will work.
- Strong leadership and transparency are important components of a successful values-based budget model.
- UK should not trade increases in out-of-state enrollment and subsequent increased tuition monies for a commitment to educating and improving the lives of Kentuckians.
- Funding to support graduate students may not be easily visible since that support may have manifested itself through support for academic support services, such as student counseling, as well as through the decreased budget cut for units.

Due to the time, the Chair moved to the next agenda item.

3. Committee Reports

b. <u>Senate's Academic Organization and Structure Committee (SAOSC) – Herman Farrell, Chair</u> i. Proposed Name Change of the College of Agriculture

Farrell, chair of the Senate's Admissions and Academic Standards Committee (SAASC), said that the **motion** from the SAASC was to recommend the Senate endorse the proposed name change of the College of Agriculture to the College of Agriculture, Food and Environment. Because the motion came from committee, no **second** was required. Farrell described the proposal to senators. College of Agriculture Dean M. Scott Smith also answered some questions. There were a few questions from senators. It was clarified that the proposed new name did indeed contain only one comma. A **vote** was taken and the motion **passed** with three opposed and five abstaining.

The Chair said that because it was very close to 5 pm, the Senate should postpone discussion on agenda item number nine. The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 pm.

Memorial Resolution for Professor *Robert N. Bostrom*, College of Communication and Information, Presented to the University Senate December 10, 2012.

Robert N. Bostrom departed this life on September 27, 2012.

He is succeeded by sons Niels Robert Bostrom (Laura) and Erik William Bostrom (Andrea), both of Versailles, and Rebecca Anne Bostrom (Gary Langfitt) of Dublin, Ohio, and four grandchildren, Maria Bostrom Galvin (Enda), Peter Christian Bostrom, Anna Rachel Bostrom, and Caitlin Amanda Bostrom, as well as his sister, Miriam Stambaugh of Lexington.

Robert was born in Kearney, Nebraska on November 2, 1930. From 1952 to 1954, Robert served as an Intelligence Analyst in the United States Army in Korea. After leaving the Army, he received his Bachelor's degree from Morningside College in Iowa in 1955, where he also played on the football team. Professor Bostrom would go on and earn his Master's Degree in 1958 and his Doctorate degree in 1961 from the University of Iowa.

He began his teaching career at Wayland High School in Iowa, before joining the collegiate ranks at Sacramento State University, Western Illinois University, and Ohio University. In 1970, Professor Bostrom joined the faculty of the Department of Communication at the University of Kentucky, where he remained until his retirement in 2000 with the rank of Professor Emeritus.

He was the author of eight books and many research articles. His research covered several dimensions of the communication discipline, including listening behavior, persuasion, and small group behavior. He was a strong advocate for behavioral and empirical research in the field.

Robert was served as Chairman of University Senate Council at the University of Kentucky (1984-1985), as president of the Southern Communication Association, and was elected to the Hall of Fame of the International Listening Association. He was also a consultant for the Educational Testing Service (ETS), contributing to the National Teacher Examination essay evaluation, redesigning the communication component of the National Teacher Education core battery test.

At UK he served as a Department Chair, Director of Graduate studies, and University Senator. He received the UK Alumni Association's Great Teacher Award in 1990.

Robert was an active participant in the Arts in Lexington and was a member of the Lexington Singers, the Lexington, Chamber Chorale, and the Lexington Musical Theater Association. He served on the planning committee for both the Lexington Opera House and the University's Singletary Center for the Arts. He was one of the founders of the Lexington Musical Theater and directed many of their productions.

He also performed in several musicals, including his favorite, "Fiddler on the Roof," in which he played the role of Tevye.

I move that this resolution be made a part of the minutes of the University Senate and that a copy be sent to Professor Bostrom's family.

Thanks very much for your questions, which are themselves helpful as we develop new programs, or revise old programs such as FLIE.

First, the FLIE degree is an A&S degree – it was located in A&S in its previous incarnation as a standalone degree (prior to 2006); it is an A&S degree in its current status as a track within International Studies; and it will continue to be an A&S degree. FLIE students must satisfy A&S college requirements; they are advised by A&S advisors; they are eligible to be A&S ambassadors, and they participate in other A&S activities as students within our college.

Having said that, let me also emphasize that the department of Economics in the Gatton School has always worked closely with our college, and we are delighted to continue this fertile cooperation: A&S 'shares' two additional degrees with Economics: (1) the bachelor's degree in Economics, and (2) the bachelor's degree in Mathematical Economics, both of which are housed within A&S.

In answer to your second question, in fact, the FLIE steering committee intends to identify a Director of Undergraduate Studies for the FLIE major, though this person hasn't yet been named. You rightly point out that a DUS would be important to the smooth functioning of the undergraduate major, to be available for advising in addition to the professional advisors, and to assist the steering committee with policy and curricular decisions. That person will be named when the degree is approved.

Thanks very much for bringing our proposal to the Undergraduate Council; we look forward to hearing from you.

14. Rationale for Change(s) – if rationale involves accreditation requirements, please include specific references to that.

The Foreign Language and International Economics (FLIE) program was established at the University of Kentucky in 1993. The major curriculum integrates the study of a world language and its culture with economics to produce not only professionals who are capable of working in the language in business contexts, but who have the cultural competence to thrive in these environments.

Globalization takes many forms and requires cultural and organizational changes at every level of society. Such change is evident in the United States as well as in most nations of the world. The most prominent motivator of this change is the business world. While business organizations and government institutions have adopted international perspectives relatively quickly, educational institutions typically lagged behind. The FLIE program was on the cutting edge of a movement to introduce such perspective and to incorporate cultural information into the study of international business and economics. The globalizing market demands the infusion of non-business components—world language, international relations, world history, cultural anthropology—into the traditional economics curriculum.

After considerable research and negotiation with the world language departments at the University of Kentucky, armed with a Title VI grant, some economics and language department faculty members established the FLIE program to highlight the linkage between success in the global arena and quality undergraduate training. The goal was to provide an interdisciplinary course of study to broaden and strengthen the international orientation of students in the program and to enhance their job skills and employment opportunities. In doing so, they bridged the gap between the College of Arts and Sciences and the Gatton College of Business and Economics and established a link that had not previously existed. They created a viable, innovative interdisciplinary program that prospered for over 10 years, such that as of 2004-2005 it boasted 170 majors and was the fastest growing major in the College of Arts and Sciences. The major was administered by the FLIE Coordinating Committee, made up of the Directors of Undergraduate Studies from the Department of Economics and those from the languages represented in the degree (French, German, Japanese, Russian and Spanish). Faculty teaching within the FLIE program worked to establish a community of learners on the UK campus, by providing scholarly leadership, lecture series, and career guidance, as well as specialized course offerings, for students who intend to work in the area of international commerce and economics.

In AY 2005-2006 the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences proposed a new major in International Studies (INT), which was officially instituted in AY 2006-2007. In his view, it was a logical step to incorporate FLIE into that major, despite the arguments against this step by the FLIE Coordinating Committee. The FLIE Coordinating Committee ultimately agreed to this step, only because they feared otherwise the program would be eliminated, so that incorporation into INT allowed for the continuation of this valuable program. The Dean had originally wanted to reorganize the curriculum as well, but the Coordinating Committee managed to argue for the integrity of the program structure within the auspices of IS. The primary difference between the other IS tracks and FLIE was that students were required to demonstrate more linguistic competence in the FLIE track; students take, on average, 12 hours of language above the intermediate level, while IS only requires study to the intermediate level. In addition, students have

a much more detailed knowledge of the cultural history associated with their language as well as a systematic grounding in economics. FLIE, in essence, is a program that provides in depth linguistic, cultural and economic competence for work in the arena of international business and in economic policy. The economics and language curricula in the degree are tightly intertwined, aiming at this particular goal. The INT degree, in contrast, allowed for a more fluid major, whereby students could concentrate on one of the following areas: Culture and the Arts; Global Environment; Human Rights and Social Movements; International Commerce; International Development; International Relations, with a focus on a particular geographic area (Africa and the Middle East; East, South and Southeast Asia; Europe; Russia and Eurasia; Latin America). That degree program is designed for a variety of possible careers in the private sector, in NGOs and governmental organizations. We were concerned, correctly, as it turns out, that the two programs were so divergent that FLIE would not be a good fit for the IS major.

The decision to return FLIE to the original departments emerged out of a meeting of the International Studies Advisory Committee, which met to discuss revamping the INT major. As a result of the redesign, INT will have three concentrations: Culture & the Arts, Global Development, and Comparative Politics & Societies. This will eliminate the seeming overlap between the International Commerce and the FLIE tracks within the INT degree. In addition, the Advisory Committee concluded that the FLIE track, due to its significant curricular differences and goals as compared to INT, should be removed from INT and once again be administered by the Departments of Modern & Classical Languages, Literatures & Cultures, the Department of Hispanic Studies and the Department of Economics in the Gatton College of Business and Economics. The faculty in the Department of Modern & Classical Languages, Literatures & Cultures (MCLLC) and the Department of Hispanic Studies (HS) and the Department of Economics voted in favor of this step in April 2012. As a result, the FLIE Coordinating Committee was reconstituted in April 2012 to coordinate this transition We have the support of the Departments of Modern and Classical Languages, Literatures and Cultures and Hispanic Studies, International Studies and the Gatton College of Business and Economics for this step.

In addition, as part of the reclamation of the major, the FLIE Coordinating Committee reassessed the course offerings and major requirements. The revamped program above will 1) make the number of credit hours (21) in the language component consistent across languages; 2) take into account changes in curricula in the various language programs, in which new courses have been introduced or other courses have been dropped or renumbered; 3) adopt the recommendation made by the 2004 external review to institute a core course for all FLIE majors (MCL/SPA 300). We recognize that this major has a high level of credit hours (although it is consonant with one of the most popular majors in the college, the International Studies major, which may require up to 48 credit hours, just three fewer credits than FLIE, as well as with the similarly designed major of Mathematical Economics, which requires a total of 54 credits). We do not take this step lightly. There is a critical shortage of language specialists in this country who can use a language in the professional arena,. As a result, the Department of Defense funds the critical language scholarships and has established the national Flagship Language program. Dan Davidson, the president of American Councils for International Education, has testified to Congress on the strategic importance of training specialists with high levels of language proficiency in this country. The American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) itself has established guidelines for the levels of language proficiency. These guidelines are internationally recognized by the profession as a standard measurement of language ability. Professional use of a language requires a minimum of Advanced proficiency on the ACTFL scale. For a native speaker of English to obtain Advanced proficiency in Spanish or French, 600 contact hours of instruction are required; in German, 990 contact hours are necessary; in Russian, 1125 contact hours are required, while 2000 are necessary for Japanese. It is essential that students in the FLIE program have maximal contact hours in the language beyond the 200-level (as well as a solid grounding in economics) if they are to continue to be employed by organizations such as the IRS (economist), Transition Networks (international account manager), Alltech (Asia-Pacific marketing coordinator), the German Embassy in Washington, DC (media analyst), CSX (manager of environmental sustainability partnerships), and Bank for International Settlements in Switzerland (economist) or to pursue advanced degrees at institutions such as the London School for Economics, Columbia University, University of California, New York University and Johns Hopkins. It is a testament to the quality of the program that our graduates work or study across the globe in such prestigious institutions. The students themselves recognize the value of this program to their professional lives and rated it highly in the alumni survey conducted for the last external review. In fact, two graduates have each endowed \$10,000 in support of study abroad for FLIE majors in Japan and Germany.

The FLIE steering committee is to be composed of one representative from Economics, one representative from each language track in the major, and the chairs of MCL and HS. The department faculty in each of the three departments (ECON, HS, MCL) vote on a representative for this committee from among their constituencies for a two-year term. Terms may be renewed indefinitely, if the majority of faculty in the representative's home department vote in favor of reappointment.

The committee elects a coordinator to serve a four-year term from among its membership. The FLIE coordinator's position may be renewed a maximum of one time. The FLIE coordinator serves as the de facto Director of Undergraduate Studies for this interdisciplinary program.

University Honors Program Committee

Established by the University Senate

A. The Honors Program is an educational program that leads to an academic graduation award (University Honors). This educational unit, an Interdisciplinary Instructional Program, reports to a dean (Dean of Undergraduate Studies). The Director (chief administrative officer) of the University Honors Program is the organizational equivalent of a department chair. (GR VII.A.1)

The Honors Program Committee (HPC) of the University Senate shall be composed of ten (10) voting members from the University Faculty broadly representative of the undergraduate colleges. The Director of the University Honors Program shall chair the HPC.

The members on the HPC shall be appointed by the Senate Council in consultation with the Dean of Undergraduate Studies A faculty member shall be eligible to serve on the University Honors Program Committee if the individual has previously taught or will be teaching a course(s) bearing Honors Program credit during the term of the faculty member's service on the HPC (GR VII.B.7). Faculty members shall serve for staggered three-year terms and may serve consecutively for no longer than six years total.

- B. The Honors Program Committee shall exercise the following functions:
 - 1. It shall serve as the Faculty of Record for the University Honors Program, with jurisdiction over the educational policies of the Honors Program (GR VII.A.1), including matters as academic requirements, curricula, course offerings in the HON series, undergraduate research, service-learning programs, and living-learning communities associated with the Honors Program. Following the policies and principles in the Governing Regulations and the University Senate Rules, it shall make recommendations to the University Senate on educational matters that require the approval of that body (GR IV.C.2-3).
 - Upon the recommendation of the Director of University Honors Program, it shall vote to approve (or not) all sections of existing courses which are proposed by colleges, departments, schools or other units to fulfill the program requirements. On behalf of the HRC, the Director shall send the list of approved sections to the University Registrar's Office for inclusion in the Schedule of Classes.
 - 3. It shall establish a process to approve faculty to teach Honors Colloquia or sections of Honors Program courses in other units.
 - 4. It shall establish guidelines for the Honors Program Course Agreement between an individual Honors Program student and individual faculty person, that will be used when a student wishes to complete for Honors Program credit an undergraduate course that has not been designated as an Honors Program course (i.e., those not designated as HON courses or as "H" designated sections of regular undergraduate courses).
 - It shall, through the Director of the University Honors Program, report periodically to the University Senate concerning the activities of the Honors Program, including the teaching and content of all courses and sections selected to fulfill the program requirements.

- 6. It shall consider and propose improvements which will enhance the Honors Program and its impact on the undergraduate curriculum.
- 7. Upon the recommendation of the Director of the University Honors Program, of the Associate Provost for Undergraduate Education, or upon its own initiative, it shall consider and propose necessary changes in the educational structure of the program or in its academic requirements.
- 8. It shall set policies for the granting of credit to transfer students for courses taken which are equivalent to those in the program and it shall communicate these policies to all undergraduate colleges of the University.
- C. Unit Faculty Rules for Educational Policy-making

Pursuant to the Governing Regulations (GR II, para. 4), the HRC, as the Faculty of Record of the educational unit, shall provide in a unit Faculty Rules document its procedures for the above processes in educational policy-making.

Clarification Senate Rule on Duplicate Credit

<u>Background</u>: When SR 5.3.1.2 was codified, it was inserted into the SR in a way that it looks like it only deals with undergraduate programs.

Snippet from Senate Rules:

5.1.9 GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

- **A.** GPA is the ratio of the number of quality points gained to the number of credit hours (whether earned or not) in courses for which the grades of A, B, C, D. or E were conferred, excluding grades in developmental or remedial courses. [US: 3/9/98; US 4/10/00; US: 9/10/01]
- **B.** If a student repeats a course in which a grade of "B" or better has been received, any subsequent grades of "B" or better and credit hours earned for those courses (if any) shall be ignored in computing the student's grade point average, unless the repeat option has been exercised according to Rule 5.3.1.1. A student does not repeat a course within the meaning of this rule if he or she only repeats the same course number where there are multiple topics, subtitles, independent study, or other courses allowed by the student's program using a common course number. [US: 4/13/98]
 - * SR 5.3.1.2 overrides SR 5.1.9.B to the extent that any contradiction may exist between them. [SREC: 10/25/12]
- **C.** Credit hours are considered as earned only if a grade of A, B, C, D, P or S was conferred.

5.3.0 REPEAT OPTION, SCHOLASTIC PROBATION, SUSPENSION AND REINSTATEMENT

5.3.1 STUDENTS IN UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS

5.3.1.1 Repeat Option [US: 11/14/83; US: 4/13/87; US: 11/14/88; US: 4/23/90;

5.3.1.2 Prohibition of Duplicate Credit [US: 10/8/07]

A student may earn credit hours and associated quality points for a course only once unless the course is designated as repeatable. A student who nonetheless has enrolled more than once for the same nonrepeatable course will be awarded credit hours and associated quality points only for the first time the course is completed during the student's academic career, regardless of the source (e.g. transfer, A.P., etc.) unless the student properly exercises the Repeat Option under SR 5.3.1.1.

Recommendation from the Senate's Rules and Elections Committee (SREC), through the Senate Council: that the Senate replace the text of SR 5.1.9.B with a reference to SR 5.3.1.2: and move the position of SR 5.3.1.2 to the location that would be numbered as SR 5.3.0.1, with a heading denoting both undergraduate and graduate programs, so that the effect will be that the text of SR 5.3.0.1 will then come to expressly apply to both undergraduate and graduate programs.

Proposed New University Senate Standing Committee

Senate Advisory Committee on Disability Accommodation and Compliance (SACDAC)

The SACDAC is a standing committee of the University Senate. The voting members of the SACDAC are the Director of the Center for the Enhancement of Learning and Teaching (CELT), or that person's designee, and four University Faculty members appointed by the Senate Council. The four University Faculty members shall serve staggered three-year terms. *Ex officio*, non-voting members of the Committee are the Academic Ombud, the Director of the Disability Resource Center (DRC), a DRC learning specialist, and the Associate Vice President for Institutional Equity or that person's designee. The committee shall be chaired by one of the four appointed University Faculty members. The SACDAC is responsible for recommending educational policy within general guidelines established by the University Senate. The SACDAC is charged to:

- 1. Recommend to the Senate Council educational policies and implementation practices that appropriately address the accommodations standards stipulated in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Law and Sections 504/508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 for students who have documented disabilities.
- 2. Hear and render decisions on issues from faculty members or the DRC pertaining to the implementation of educational policies as they relate to practices for disability accommodation and regulatory compliance.
- 3. Monitor the alignment between the University Senate's educational policies and Federal compliance and accommodation regulations, and recommend educational policy revisions, as warranted.
- 4. Issue an annual report on the work of the SACDAC for consideration by the Senate Council, the University Senate and the wider University community.

Recommendation from Senate Council: the Senate approve the addition of the language regarding the proposed new standing committee "Senate's Advisory Committee on Disability Accommodation and Compliance (SACDAC)" to the Senate Rules in a place to be determined by the Senate's Rules and Elections Committee.

Center for Health Services Management and Research

Proposed Name Change

The Center for Health Services Management and Research was established in 1998 by the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, as a campus-wide multidisciplinary research center reporting to the Chancellor of the Medical Center. The Center was established to address important issues in health services organization, financing, accessibility, cost, quality, appropriateness, and outcomes with the ultimate goal of improving the health status of individuals ands populations. In addition to its health research responsibilities, the Center was also charged with outreach responsibilities to train health professionals for work in managed care and other new health services environments.

In 2004 the Board of Trustees approved the creation of the College of Public Health. As a consequence, the newly created Department of Health Service Management within the College of Public Health assumed some of the health management training responsibilities of the Center. Research activities/efforts related to health services/outcomes remained in all colleges of the academic medical center, and in several other academic units on campus, and the need remained for a trans-college multidisciplinary research center reporting to the Provost. However, the catalyzing function of the Center waned.

The renewed focus nationally on health services/systems research created by the Affordable Care Act, has resulted in substantial funding opportunities in this area for UK faculty, and has increased the need for an active multidisciplinary research center to catalyze campus research in these areas. It is a propitious time to reinvigorate the intellectual life and scientific output of the Center.

The Center will maintain its focus on creating, testing and scaling next generation solutions for health care delivery to improve both the efficiency and effectiveness of healthcare delivered within the UK Healthcare system and overall population health. The goal of the Center will be to accelerate the discovery of new knowledge concerning clinical effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of health care delivery innovations, particularly for rural and limited-resource settings.

The Center will maintain productive relationships with federal and nonfederal extramural funding agencies that position the Center's campus-wide multidisciplinary team of investigators to compete successfully for research funding, particularly in the growing fields of patient-centered outcomes research (PCOR) and comparative effectiveness research (CER). The Center will collaborate with the Center for Clinical and Translational Science, particularly with the community outreach and biomedical informatics cores, to take advantage of the synergistic goals and infrastructure needs of HSR and translational science.

This request is for an administrative update to the Center's name. The revised title of the unit is the *Center for Health Services Research.* The Center shall continue to report to the Provost.

NEW MULTIDISCIPLINARY CENTER

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve the establishment of the Center for Health Services Management and Research.

<u>Background</u>: The concept of the University of Kentucky Center for Health Services Management and Research was developed in 1997 to address important issues in health services organization, financing, accessibility, cost, quality, appropriateness, and outcomes, with the ultimate goal of improving the health status of individuals and populations. In its roles as consultant and continuing education provider, the Center will provide information about health policy issues, perform health research and train health professionals for working in managed care and other new health services environments.

The Center will strengthen the health services activities of faculty in the five colleges of the UK Chandler Medical Center. In particular, the Center will work to build and improve the research infrastructure, support faculty research programs, develop faculty and student competencies, and encourage interdisciplinary research and consultation. Externally, the Center will create and sustain partnerships with public and private entities for education, research, and service.

The Center Director will report to the Chancellor of the Medical Center. Faculty associates will be appointed whose work in research, teaching and service are in concert with the mission of the Center. Grant funding for research, continuing education and service projects is expected from the Kentucky Cabinet for Health Services, federal health and health services research agencies, private foundations, health service organizations, and health professions associations.
