TEACHING/LEARNING METHODS:

NUR 451 will be taught using a combination of methods. Students must be very self-directed and demonstrate initiative to be successful in an online course. Reading, reflection and writing will occur independently but course faculty are available for support and feedback. The course content/lectures and assignments will be available on Canvas. Students will utilize the internet to perform literature searches, participate in discussions, use email and connect with faculty and classmates through virtual technology in Canvas. Computer technology will enhance the learning process by allowing collaboration with peers and faculty for group assignments and review and feedback for writing assignments. The course is interactive and participation will be required. All students are required to meet the computer and technology requirements listed below.

COMPUTER ACCESS EXPECTATIONS:

Students must meet assignment deadlines, but are not required to be online at specific, assigned times. This is an interactive course and we highly recommend accessing the course in Canvas at least three times per week to be fully engaged and successful. If for some reason, you cannot access the site at home due to temporary computer breakdown or other circumstances, it is your responsibility to access the site through other means (e.g., going to local public or school library). This course is heavy in reading and writing/communications requirements; plan time for interactions and completion of assignments. WHAT IS REQUIRED TO PASS THIS COURSE:

1. Obtain a minimum grade of 76% for the course.*

The course letter grade is the total score of quizzes, discussion question responses, and other written assignments (see page 10 for assignment weights and grade calculation). The final cumulative numerical grade must be $\geq 76\%$ to pass the course.

2. Obtain a satisfactory rating of clinical performance.*

Clinical performance is graded "pass/fail" in that the student completes all of the identified clinical activities on page 18 and "meets" or "fails to meet" all of the student learning outcomes on page 19 of the course syllabus. Students must pass the clinical rotation to pass the course regardless of quiz or written assignment grades. A pass in clinical is defined as completing all of the activities on the Clinical Learning Activities Checklist and receiving either a Satisfactory or Outstanding rating on the final evaluation of *all* categories of the Clinical Student Performance Outcomes form. If a student does not meet the requirements for passing the clinical portion of the course and earns a total score of 76 or higher in other course work, the student will receive a letter grade of "D." (A "D" is assigned for the benefit of quality points and does not constitute successful completion of a nursing course.)

* MIDTERM EVALUATION:

The first quiz grade and the first current events journal grade will be posted and available to students on Canvas by mid-term. A mid-term assessment of each student's clinical performance and progress toward achieving the clinical goals will also be conducted that includes a self-assessment by each student and an assessment completed by the clinical instructor.

CHEATING AND PLAGIARISM:

PUBLIC HEALTH CLINICAL

Your clinical experience in NUR 451 will be different from any other type of clinical experience you have had in the past. In public health we focus on populations not on individuals. Ultimately, what we design, implement, or adopt as policy may filter down to individuals and their families. We also work independently in public health. We must gain entry into the community, complete a community assessment, which includes collecting statistical data, and key informant interviews, a windshield survey, and finally a community needs assessment. Just as you complete a head-to-toe assessment on your individual patients, public health completes a "head-to-toe" assessment on a community using all five senses for data collection. Based on your assessment data, for your clinical you will complete a series of assignments that culminate into a population-focused project which addresses one of the objectives from Healthy People 2020.

Your clinical faculty will assist you in identifying a community or population to target. A community can be defined by geographical boundaries (i.e. a neighborhood or county), personal characteristics (i.e. age, race/ethnicity, medical condition), or common shared interests (i.e. occupational groups, religious communities). A population can be targeted because it is vulnerable to health disparities and adverse health outcomes.

Students are required to connect with an agency that serves the identified community or population for their clinical experience. Examples of agencies include non-profit organizations, volunteer groups, worksites, school systems, healthcare organizations, faith-based communities, child care facilities, and environmental health agencies. Students may work with their current employers if applicable (must not be part of current job duties). It is the student's responsibility to find an agency and a point of contact within the agency. The role of the agency point of contact is to be the main point of contact for the student at the agency, provide an orientation of the agency's policies, and to provide feedback to the student and clinical faculty. UK clinical faculty will remain in continuous contact with the agency point of contact and maintain responsibility for monitoring of clinical experience.

This course requires the completion of 90 clinical hours. <u>Students should use clinical time to engage in the nursing process as they assess community/population needs, communicate with community members including agency staff, and intervene to promote optimal health for clients in a variety of settings.</u>

Details on the clinical assignments and project are found in the clinical assignments packet, which is available on Canvas. Clinical instructors will guide students on the completion of all assignments and assist with the development and completion of the clinical project.

Expected Clinical Outcomes:

- 1. Gain entry into the local community.
- 2. Perform a targeted community assessment.
- 3. Identify and describe a variety of community resources that work collaboratively to improve the public's health.
- 4. Develop and maintain a current knowledge of emerging local and global health issues.
- 5. Describe and be involved in policy-making activities that affect health status of communities.
- 6. Plan and Develop an intervention that addresses an identified health issue.
- 7. Describe how the professional nurse can be involved in collaborative efforts to improve the health status of communities.

Clinical Requirements:

To complete the course learning outcomes, the following learning activities must be completed as determined by the clinical instructor:

- 1. Application of the Community as Partner public health model.
- 2. Application of nursing research and literature
- 3. Application of population/community analysis
- 4. Application of leadership/management strategies.
- Application of professional writing.

CPR Certification / Immunization Compliance:

Take a Look at Common Trouble Spots

- Stairwells and out-of-the-way corridors Don't use the stairs alone. Stairwells can be traps as well as a way to save time or get some exercise. Never enter a stairwell to escape pursuers or potential attackers. Go to an area where there are other people.
- Elevators don't get into elevators with people who look out of place or behave in a strange or threatening manner. If you find yourself in an elevator with someone who makes you nervous, get off as soon as possible.

- After hours Don't work late alone. Create a buddy system for walking to parking lots or public transportation or use the escort service or ask security to walk you to your car.
- Parking lots or garages Choose a well-lighted garage or parking space. Always lock your car and roll your windows up all the way. If you notice any strangers hanging around the parking lot, notify security or the police. When you approach your car, have the door key ready. Check the floor and back seats before getting in. Lock your car as soon as you get in... before you buckle your seat belt.
