**COURSE DESCRIPTION**

**Bulletin Description:**

An overview of the Physical Therapy profession(s) including aspects of professional practice, areas of specialization, professional issues and trends, and career paths and opportunities. The course will consist of assignments, lectures and interactive discussions led by faculty and visiting professionals designed to expand students' understanding of the profession(s) and to assist in educational and career planning and discernment.

**Student Learning Outcomes:**

The purpose of this course is to provide students with a broad understanding of the Physical Therapy profession(s) including general areas of practice responsibilities and specialization, important issues and trends, and career paths and opportunities.

Upon completion of this course, the successful student will be able to:

1. Describe the role and professional of physical therapy in the current health care system.
2. Explain the process to actively pursue doctoral education to become a licensed physical therapist
3. Describe the scope of practice of a physical therapist in areas of musculoskeletal, integumentary, cardiopulmonary, neurological, and health and wellness practice.

### **Attendance:**

Attendance and punctuality will be considered part of your grade. Tardiness is defined as arriving after the class is scheduled to begin or departure before the end of the class session. Three tardies constitute one unexcused absence. Each unexcused absence will result in a deduction of 1 point (1%) from your course grade.

### **Course Assignments:**

Course assignments consist of:

- 1) 5 short quizzes
- 2) Scavenger Hunt regarding the PT profession and career options.
- 3) PT program application assignment

### **Summary Description of Course Assignments:**

- 1) The **five quizzes** will be short 10-15 item quizzes administered at the beginning of 5 different classes (see the calendar) on the regions of the body and their examination. These will be accessed electronically from the classroom using a laptop or smart phone.
- 2) The **scavenger hunt** is due the second week of the course. Students will be sent on a virtual scavenger hunt searching key internet resources utilized by physical therapists. These could include specific areas of the American Physical Therapy Association, Kentucky Physical Therapy Association, Kentucky Board of Physical Therapy or Institute for Healthcare Improvement websites among others. The "destinations" will address topics such as educational preparation, current topics, legislation and advocacy, employment options, and so forth.
- 3) Submit **3 links to PT educational program application materials**. Students will explore at least three DPT programs at institutions of their choice and explore the requirements, including the application process and materials. The student will provide links to those program application materials and provide a brief written summary of expectations and requirements for application. This document should conclude with a summary paragraph that succinctly compares and contrasts requirements across the three programs.

More information regarding these assignments will be provided. The Scavenger hunt is worth 20% (20 pts) of the course grade and the quizzes are worth 10 points each (50%). Attendance and the submission of PT program application web links are worth 15% (15 points) each.

### **Submission of Assignments:**

All assigned work must be completed and submitted at the beginning of class on the due date to receive full credit. Written assignments will be submitted on Canvas via the Assignment Tab.

Label all submissions with your name and course number PT 120.

**Late work:**

Late work will not be accepted for a grade unless approved by the instructor. If approved, points will be deducted for late work at the rate of 5 points (5%) of your total course grade per day. Written assignments will be submitted on CANVAS via the Assignment Tab. After one week, late work will not be accepted. Late work associated with an approved excused absence will not be penalized; due dates for submission of late work for an excused absence will be negotiated with the instructor.

**Excused Absences:**

Students need to notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible. *Senate Rules*

5.2.4.2 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences:

- a) serious illness,
- b) illness or death of family member,
- c) University-related trips,
- d) major religious holidays, and
- e) other circumstances found to fit "reasonable cause for nonattendance" by the professor.

Students anticipating an absence for a major religious holiday are responsible for notifying the instructor in writing of anticipated absences due to their observance of such holidays no later than the last day in the semester to add a class. Two weeks prior to the absence is reasonable, but should not be given any later.
