#### Description of Course Activities and Assignments:

Discussion Board Post- Introduction, Areas of Interest, and Specialization

15 pts.

During the first week of class, students will post an entry on the Discussion Board introducing themselves, briefly discussing research areas of interest, and state their specialization (i.e., Hospitality and Tourism Management; Merchandising, Apparel, and Textiles). Students should comment on at least one post of another student in the course.

#### Research Article Summaries (8)

200 pts.

Prepare a 1-2 pg. summary of a research article relating to your area of interest. Topics for each article summary are identified in the syllabus. Upload the assignment to the specified drop location on Canvas.

Discussion Board Response Questions- How to Build Social Science Theories (9) 90 pts.

A Discussion Board Forum on Canvas will be started by the instructor for each book chapter. Students must answer questions posed by the instructor and comment on at least one post of another student in the course.

#### Discussion Board Posts- Theory Reaction (12 @ 10pts. each)

120 pts.

Six weeks (modules) of the course will be spent on the presentation of theories in Retailing and Tourism Management. During these weeks, students will review the posted presentations and supplemental readings and make two posts on the Canvas Discussion Board reacting to the material. Reactions may facilitate a scholarly discussion, pose questions for the instructor, relate the material to the student's own research interest, etc. Students should comment on at least one post of another student in the course.

#### Analysis of Research and Theory Paper and PowerPoint

325pts.

Prepare an 8-10 page paper that examines various studies related to your research area of interest. Analyze the theories, research questions, hypothesis, variables, data collection methods, and statistical analysis that each study uses. Prepare a PowerPoint summarizing your findings. Upload the assignments to the specified drop locations on Canvas.

100 pts.

#### **Course Policies:**

- 1. The student is ultimately responsible for his or her learning experience in this course.
- 2. All out of class assignments must be typed and should reflect the standards of a university (i.e. accurate spelling, correct grammar, good sentence structure, etc.).
- 3. Assignments can be made up with an excused absence only and must be made up within one week of the assigned due date. Assignments turned in late will lose 1/10th of their value per day including weekends.
- 4. Academic dishonesty, such as cheating and plagiarism, will be dealt with according to guidelines stated in the latest edition of the *Student Rights and Responsibilities* Handbook. The guidelines state that the minimum punishment for cheating or plagiarism is an "E" in the course.

<u>University Senate Rule</u>: If attendance is required or serves as a criterion for a grade in a course, and if a student has excused absences in excess of one-fifth of the class contact hours for that course, a student shall have the right to petition for a "W", and the faculty member may require the student to petition for a "W" or take an "I" in the course.

#### Verification of Absences:

Students may be asked to verify their absences in order for them to be considered excused. Senate Rule 5.2.4.2 states that faculty have the right to request "appropriate verification" when students claim an excused absence because of illness or death in the family. Appropriate notification of absences due to university-related trips is required prior to the absence.

#### Academic Integrity:

Per university policy, students shall not plagiarize, cheat, or falsify or misuse academic records. Students are expected to adhere to University policy on cheating and plagiarism in all courses. The minimum penalty for a first offense is a zero on the assignment on which the offense occurred. If the offense is considered severe or the student has other academic offenses on their record, more serious penalties, up to suspension from the university may be imposed.

Plagiarism and cheating are serious breaches of academic conduct. Each student is advised to become familiar with the various forms of academic dishonesty as explained in the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities. A plea of ignorance is not acceptable as a defense against the charge of academic dishonesty. It is important that you review this information as all ideas borrowed from others need to be properly credited.

Part II of Student Rights and Responsibilities (available online <a href="http://www.uky.edu/StudentAffairs/Code/part2.html">http://www.uky.edu/StudentAffairs/Code/part2.html</a>) states that all academic work, written or otherwise, submitted by students to their instructors or other academic supervisors, is expected to be the result of their own thought, research, or self-expression. In cases where students feel unsure about the question of plagiarism involving their own work, they are obliged to consult their instructors on the matter before submission.

When students submit work purporting to be their own, but which in any way borrows ideas, organization, wording or anything else from another source without appropriate acknowledgement of the fact, the students are guilty of plagiarism. Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work, whether it be a published article, chapter of a book, a paper from a friend or some file, or something similar to this. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work which a student submits as his/her own, whoever that other person may be.

Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone. When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources of information, the student must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where and how he/she employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain (Section 6.3.1).
