#### **Course Description:**

In this course we will deal with various aspects of Spanish in the world: Spanish in the USA, and the expansion of Spanish through the media and cinema, Spanish and the other official languages of the Iberian Peninsula and the language politics of Latin America.

Spanish is considered the third most spoken language in the world. Although it is spoken in very distant regions, it enjoys certain uniformity in the standard higher level which allows the speakers on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean to communicate easily. The most important differences are found in the supregmental level, meaning in the different intonation, a product of the diverse linguistic substracts in the Spanish speaking countries. Another difference is observed in the lexical diversity which derives from the different evolution of the Spanish language in every region but also from the influence of other languages in the corresponding regions. The spelling and the linguistic norm guarantee the unity of the language; also the necessity of collaboration between the different Language Academies of the Spanish language in order to preserve unity contributes to the expansion of the Spanish used in literary, scientific, pedagogical, and multimedia discourse.

#### Course objectives:

- Determine diachronically the importance of the Spanish language
- Connect historical facts to the development of Spanish to a world language.
- Discover less known varieties of Spanish in the world
- Explore language policy in the Spanish speaking world
- Investigate the role of Spanish in the international organizations and in media.
- Assess the contribution of the Royal Academy of the Spanish Language (Real Academia de Lengua Española) and the corresponding Academies in the rest of the Spanish speaking countries to the strengthening of Spanish in the world.

#### Attendance and participation:

Successful progress in the class will require that students keep up with assigned materials. Class discussions and exercises are also essential. An excused absence is, as a general rule, one that is accompanied by an official document (obituary, in case of death in the family, hospitalization, university athletic event, etc.) Stamped excuses from the Student Health Services **DO NOT constitute** an excused absence. A faculty member

must verify any illness with a Health Service Physician. These strict guidelines will be implemented from the very first day of class. *More than three absences (either justified or not) will result on a failing grade in this course.* Absences due to the observance of religious holidays must be notified in written the first 10 days of classes. Late arrivals are very disruptive for both instructor and students, therefore, **DO NOT ARRIVE LATE**. Every two late arrivals will count as an unexcused absence. If, for any reason, a student cannot attend a class, it is the student responsibility to contact a classmate and find out what was done in class and what is due next class. Because class participation is 10% of the final grade, all students will be expected to participate actively in all class activities, talking only in Spanish.

#### Class preparation and homework:

Homework is an essential part of this course, therefore, students are required to complete each assignment and turn it into the instructor of the class on the day specified in the syllabus. Each homework assignment should be properly identified (name of student, date of the assignment and page number in textbook), it should also be organized and presented in a clear fashion. The organization and cleanliness (limpieza) of assignments will constitute part of the grade.

#### Presentation:

Every student must choose one of the topics of the course and prepare it based on a specific research article indicated by the instructor. 20 minute PowerPoint presentations are expected to be sent to the instructor one week before the day of the presentation. Students are expected to participate in discussions following the presentations and share their opinions.

#### Exams:

In order to evaluate students' progress in the class, there will be 2 exams. Please, keep in mind that THERE WILL NOT BE ANY MAKE-UPS FOR THESE EXAMS. If, for any reason, a student needs to miss during the day of an exam, he/she should discuss his/her case with the instructor in advance. There will be, eventually, some pop-quizzes.
