Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to explore current linguistic research on Spanish dialects through the discussion and the analysis of their theoretical and empirical frameworks. Some of the topics to be discussed in this course will be: terminology and concepts of dialectology, dialectal picture of the Spanish-speaking world, sociolinguistics and dialectology, language contact and dialectology, variation and language standardization.

Objectives and Student Learning Outcomes:

- Knowledge of different theoretical and empirical studies on Spanish around the world.
- Appreciation of the value of dialectal forms as vital expressions of a language.
- Development of skills to conduct research in the area of dialectology.
- Application of this knowledge and skills set to the teaching of Spanish.
- Use of this knowledge and skills set as a tool for literary analysis.
