WORLD THEATRE I (534 BC-1500 AD) TA 171

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A multicultural and intercontinental exploration of the history, theory, dramatic literature, and practices of theatre from 534 BC-1500 AD. The first of four courses in a four semester sequence of World Theatre.

During the course of the semester, various ideas relative to how theatre evolved in these cultures, the influences of the other arts on its development as well as the impact of religion, government, and patronage.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Students should be able to describe the key identifiers for each period such as the guiding purpose for the theatre, the theatre as a facility, the major playwrights and plays, and staging techniques.
- 2. To describe how the major historical events, philosophies, and discoveries effected the theatre of the period.
- 3. To discuss thoroughly a play after reading or seeing it by applying elements learned during the semester.
- 4. To conduct basic research for these periods of theatre.

COURSE SCHEDULE:

Week I	Introduce course, requirements, & expectations. Discussion "What is History?" What is theatre history? What is drama? What is theatre?
Week II	Explore Greek Civilization and the early development of theatre as drama and theatre in performance.
Week III	Explore Aristotelian values as delineated in <i>The Poetics</i> and examine the theatre as a facility, and production practices
Week IV	Compare and contrast the works of Sophocles, Aeschylus, and Euripides
Week V	Explore the evolution of Greek comedy
Week VI	Begin overview of Roman civilization and interest in various types of

entertainments

Week VII	Explore the Roman theatre as a facility and the practice of theatre plus compare and contrast these elements with Greek theatre.
Week VIII	Discuss Roman tragedy and Seneca
Week IX	Discuss Comedies of Plautus and compare Terence's comedies with those written by Plautus.
Week X	Indian Theatre-early Sanskrit development & theatre practices
Week XI	Other early Asian theatre practices and beginnings of western medieval theatre.
Week XII	Theatre of Hroswitha and other early medieval dramatic practices
Week XIII	Discuss the introduction of religious theatrical presentations.
Week XV	Discuss the English Mystery Cycles.

ASSIGNMENTS:

Week XVI

to make at least one oral presentation to their classmates (1)
to write three (3) papers or projects
(30%)

Discuss the Morality plays in England and on the continent.

• to take several examinations (3 or more) that demonstrate their ability to retain the basic elements in the selected periods and understand the majors plays, theories, and genres. (60%)

- 1. An anthology of drama for the selected plays to be read.
- 2. A theatre history textbook.
- 3. Selected articles and reviews from professional theatre journals and newspapers that are relevant to the topic of study.
