ADVANCED ACTING

TA 326

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A course of advanced study focused on a significant acting style or performance tradition. This semester the course will be a study of the basic techniques and theory of Japanese classical acting in Kabuki. Class will include scene work from the various styles of Kabuki, Noh Mask and Movement, and Kabuki dance. In addition, the class will explore how Japanese acting techniques have influenced Western acting and in particular the works of St. Denis and Grotowksi.

COURSE SCHEDULE

Weeks 1& 2: Introduction and overview of the course. Lecture and discussion of the history of Japanese theatre. Review films of Kyogen dance as well as films of Noh, Kabuki, and Bunraka in performance

Week 3: Begin discussion of a group project that will serve as a culmination of the course. This will be an ensemble effort with the entire class performing in public venue.

Week 4: An introduction to Noh Mask and Movement Techniques. Assignment of Noh scenes.

Week 5: Performance of Noh scenes. Critique, coaching and response.

Week 6: Continuation of Noh scenes.

Week 7: Introduction to basic Kabuki techniques.

Week 8: Assignment of scenes. Rehearsal and coaching.

Week 9: Performance of scenes. Discusssion and Kabuki make-up workshop.

Week 10: Continuation of scenes, continuation of the make-up workshop (if necessary) and lecture on the role of the Onegata in Kabuki.

Week 11: Kabuki dance instruction with a guest lecture and demonstration.

Week 12: Lecture and films of the effects of Japanese theatre on contemporary practitioners.

Week 13: Classic Western Theatre interpreted by Kurasawa, Ran, Throne of Blood.

Week 14 & 15: Preparation and performance of the capstone Project.

READING LIST

- 1. An anthology of plays from both Kabuki and Noh.
- 2. Biographies of Japanese actors and their performance histories.
- 3. Selected articles and reviews from professional and scholarly theatre journals.

METHOD OF EVALUATION

Students will be evaluated on their ability to execute the various acting and movement techniques taught during the course of study. In addition, they will be graded on class participation in discussions and demonstrations and their active commitment to the scene work and the capstone project. Also this is a studio class and attendance is mandatory. For a guide to University approved excuses for missing class the student is referred to the Student Handbook.
